Trustees settle for 2 per cent hike if they get \$6 million from staff

Higher taxes, fewer services and salary cuts are among the highlights of the Halton Board of Education's 1996 budget.

The \$272 million budget, finally approved Tuesday night, will cost the average taxpayer an extra \$26 a year in educational taxes.

It will also mean fewer classroom computers, staff layoffs and cuts to busing services. In a historic move, trustees also voted unanimously to ask for \$6 million in salary and benefit concessions from the board's teachers and other unionized employees.

"I think this figure is reasonable," said Halton Hills Trustee Dick Howitt. "I think every part of the system needs to make a sacrifice."

As part of that across-the-board sacrifice, Mr. Howitt suggested trustee salaries be cut by five per cent, effective Sept. 1. "It's an insignificant amount," That's timely; but I think its a symbolic thing on our part to show

Trustees approved the cut, which will bring their annual salaries down to \$12,255 and save the board about \$12,000 a year.

Trustees also agreed to eliminate school lunchroom supervisors, cut more than 80 administrative and secretarial positions and lay off 25 per cent of the counsellors, therapists and instructional assistants who provide support services to students,

The decision to cut support services doesn't sit well with Heather Holden, executive director of the Learning Disabilities Association of Halton.

"You're forcing the kids to fit into the 25 per cent cut," she said. 'The system is supposed to be adapting to the kids, not vice versa."

The association has suggested it may take legal action against the board for violating provincial regulations meant to protect students with special needs.

School board employees are also unhappy with the budget, which will result in layoff notices for at least 400 staff members. A statement issued by the Trachtman), Kelly Clark (Connie) and Alan Coalition of Concerned Halton Public Education Employees warns, "Employees, the community, parents and students should be very concerned about the impact this budget will have on the quality of public education in Halton."

Trustees began the budget process facing a proposed \$286 million budget, which would have required an

eight per cent tax hike. Under the pared-down budget, taxpayers will see a two per cent mill rate increase, which translates to the \$26 jump on a residential assessment of \$6,700.
