



Students and cops team up at Respect for Law Camp

A group of grade 7 students will be rounded up and escorted into Halton Regional Police headquarters on Bronte Road August 24 and 25.

This will not, however, be punishment for senseless acts of vandalism or shoplifting.

Instead, the students will be on the right side of the law as they take part in the fifth annual Halton Respect for Law Camp, sponsored by the Optimist Clubs of Halton.

The camp is designed to show students that officers are regular people like everyone else.

Regional police will be joined by the OPP, the RCMP and a local fire depart- ment to demonstrate techniques and equipment. Much of the learning will be "hands on," say organizers.

Applications are available at all schools and must be submitted by June 1.

A \$25 fee covers the cost of the camp.
