Explosive situation is just averted in grass fire

A grass fire carried potential for disaster last week as flames burned quickly toward an explosives manufacturing plant, fire officials say.

Sparks spitting from a passing train set off the blaze on both sides of the railway tracks shortly after noon May 14 on No. 10 Sideroad, west of Guelph Line.

The blaze spread out of control both east and west through grass

and bush for more than nine hours, said Fire Chief Harold Penson. The day-long ordeal grew potentially disastrous as flames came

close to igniting the building at Nordex Explosives Ltd. on Second Line.

"It was within 50 to 100 feet away from the building when we got it stopped at 9:45 p.m.," said the fire chief. "That added to the tense situation we already had."

It took 21 firefighters, nine from Halton Hills, to knock down the blaze, Chief Penson said. The men brought water to the fire scenes in portable pumps they carried on their backs.

Grass fires ignited by passing trains are common, however, few spread out of control, he said.

In this case, high winds pushed the flames along the grass, which was dry on top, Chief Penson explained.

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

Pooch may soon need trophy wall.

A local dog will soon need its own mantelpiece for its collection of awards.

The beagle Top Notch has received yet another honour for helping save its elderly fallen owner in July last year.

The devoted canine was handed an award from the Halton. Regional Police Services Board after its barks led a search team to 75-year-old First Line resident James Thomson, who had been missing for five days.

"Top Notch saved his beloved owner's life," said Halton Regional Police Deputy Chief Ean Algar during the May 16 awards ceremony at police headquarters in Oakville.

Mr. Thomson, who suffers from Alzheimer's and Parkinson's diseases, did not return home after taking Top Notch for a walk June 26. The dog's barks eventually alerted a search team, which discovered Mr. Thomson lying in dense bush and bog near a trail about 500 metres south of his Moffat home.

Volunteer searcher Lynn McBratney, a front desk clerk at the Milton police station, and her friends Kim Knox, Ross Knox, Jan Torrell and Cathy Comeau, all from out of town, were honoured with civilian awards for their role in the rescue.

"All of them deserve praise and thanks for their efforts in less than ideal conditions," Deputy Chief Algar said. "Their unselfish efforts caused a happy conclusion and no doubt saved Mr. Thomson's life.".
