

Canada Trust looking for worthy non-profit groups

While many organizations and businesses are desperate for money, Canada Trust is ready to give it away.

Canada Trust is looking to help non-profit groups fund their environmentally-friendly projects through the Friends of the Environment Foundation.

The bank created the foundation, supported by Canada Trust and its customers, six years ago to help protect and improve the country's environment.

However, "not everybody knows about it," said Chris Buntin, manager of Canada Trust on Main Street.

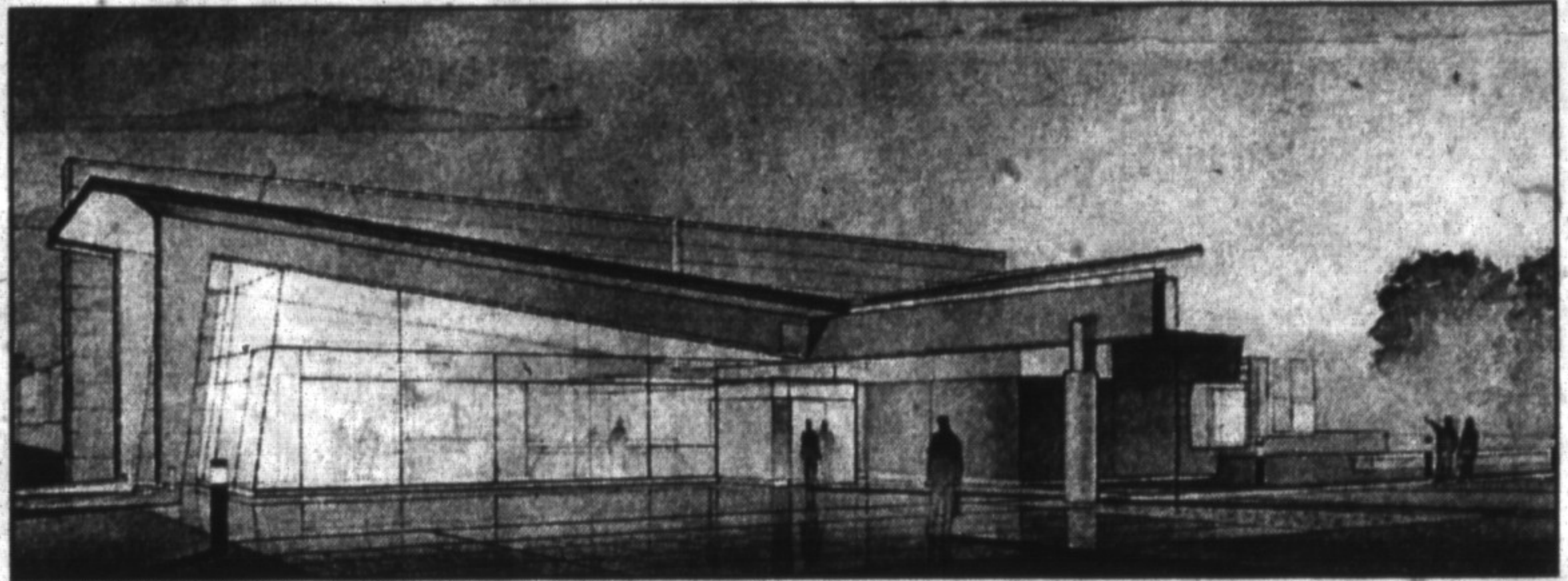
The foundation is active in every munic-

ipality where there's a Canada Trust branch - 115 chapters in total. Funds are raised through customer donations, which are matched by the bank. "We don't have hundreds of thousands of dollars or anything," Ms Buntin said, "but we've got a couple of thousand sitting there."

Local organizations such as schools, environmental groups and other non-profit agencies are invited to request funding for their projects by filling out an application.

Projects funded, in the past have ranged from recycling and composting programs to wildlife preservation and tree planting.

"The whole idea is getting the money back out into the community doing some good," Ms Buntin said. For more information, contact Canada Trust at 878-2834.

District HQ moves to Milton

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Halton Regional Police have broken new ground.

Construction of Milton's new police station got underway recently following a 10-year wait.

The state-of-the-art facility will replace the King Street station, the former district health office, which police first occupied in the early 1980s as a temporary location.

"The projected needs of Milton for the next 20 years will be accommodated by this facility," said Halton police Deputy Chief Ean Algar at the official ground breaking ceremony Friday.

The new building, to be situated on the south side of Childs Drive just east of Ontario Street, will serve as headquarters for police District 1 - made up of Milton and Halton Hills.

District 1 headquarters, which handles administrative duties, is currently located at the police's Georgetown station.

The \$2.8 million facility will bring improvements in areas where the current "temporary" station falls short,

said Keith Moore, co-ordinator of planning and research for Halton police.

Police have been unhappy with a lack of privacy for detectives investigating cases and limited security at the King Street station.

The 22,000-square-foot building will feature a multiple camera monitoring system that will allow front desk clerks to view 16 different areas of the station on one screen, Mr. Moore said.

Panic strips will be installed along hallway walls to improve the safety of officers. When pressed, an alarm will sound.

The building will also feature a gym, community room for public meetings, lounge area and plenty of parking, according to Mr. Moore.

"We're really into the current age as far as police facilities go," he noted.

He said about 65 officers will initially work out of the new station.

Dunlop Farrow Architects of Toronto designed the facility and Consolidated Canadian Contractors Inc. are building it.

NOTICE OF A PUBLIC MEETING

TAKE NOTICE THAT the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Milton will hold a Public Meeting on Monday, July 8, 1996 commencing at 7:30p.m. in the Council Chambers, Town Hall, Victoria Park Square, 43 Brown Street, Milton, to receive information and public input on an application for a general amendment and site specific amendments to Milton's Comprehensive Zoning By-law No. 61-85, as amended, pursuant to Section 34 of The Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P. 13, as amended.

The purpose of the proposed amendments are:

- 1 - to clarify that composting operations are NOT included within the definition of 'Agriculture' and therefore are not permitted within zones that permit Agricultural uses
- 2 - provide an exception for the Halton Waste Management site to compost given that they have received the approval of the Province under the Consolidated Hearing Act
- 3 - permit a 560 sq. metres soil mixing building associated with an existing composting operation at 100 Britannia Road East, Milton.

A key map illustrating the area affected by the general amendment is not provided because it is of general application to all areas of the Town of Milton. A key map illustrating the area affected by the site specific amendments (Halton Waste Management Site and 100 Britannia Road) is not provided as notice of the public meeting and a key map for these rezonings, has been forwarded to all owners and tenants as prescribed by the Planning Act.

ANY PERSON MAY attend the Public Meeting to obtain information and make a verbal representation to identify issues of concern and/or express views in support of or in opposition to, the proposed amendments. A copy of the associated Planning and Development Department Staff Report may be obtained or reviewed after 2:00 p.m. on Friday, July 5th, 1996 by contacting the Planning and Development Department at Town Hall, Victoria Park Square.

IF A PERSON or public body that files an appeal of a decision of the Town of Milton in respect of the proposed zoning by-law does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Town of Milton before the proposed zoning by-law is adopted, the Ontario Municipal Board may dismiss all or part of the appeal.
