The Milton District Mustangs boys baser ball team is just one win away from playing at the SkyDome this month.

The top ranked 'Stangs have been the hottest team at the 16-entry, double-knock-out Blue Jay Cup playdown tournament over the past week, and have earned a seat in Sunday's semifinal match with Brampton Centennial.

With MD sitting 4-0 after round-robin play and Brampton Centennial at 3-1 — with their one loss coming in a 4-2 final to Milton — the 'Stangs need just one win to reach the Bob Prentice Cup finals next

Wednesday, June 26 at the SkyDome.
Brampton Centennial meanwhile, would need to beat MD twice Sunday to steal the trip away from them.

And with each pitcher allowed just 27 outs throughout the playdowns, MD sits in excellent shape heading into Sunday's showdown. "Pat Lynch still has 21 outs and Jeremy Ridley has 15 while Jimmy Fay, Jeff Langille and Shayne Ridley can all be used as well. Their (Brampton Centennial) top pitcher only has three outs left. I like where we sit right now," said manager Jim Ridley.

While the 'Stangs have gotten great pitching from Fay, Langille, Jeremy Ridley, Adam Rooke and Mark McPhail in the past week, the big story has been the hitting as they have outscored their opponents 40-5.

They began tournament play last Friday in Oshawa by downing Unionville 11-2 and destroying Michael Power/St. Joseph's of Toronto 15-0. After weekend downpours washed out the rest of their games, they resumed play Tuesday when they edged Brampton Centennial 4-2 and then followed up with a huge 10-0 rout over Orchard Park of Stoney Creek.

Kevin Wilson has hit two homeruns so far while McPhail and the two Ridley brothers have also had homers. Each player in the line-up has at least two hits over the four-game round-robin.
