Union employees blast Catholic board cutbacks

Dear Editor:

At the meeting of April 30, 1996, the Halton Roman Catholic School Board passed a budget that raised the mill rate of Catholic taxpayers by 1.9 per cent for an increase in revenue of \$1 million. Staff layoffs were factored into this budget. The board elected to layoff 10 per cent of CUPE Local 3166, clerical, secretarial and technical Employees and reduce the hours of work for a further 28 per cent of our membership, netting the board a savings of \$280,000. This budget included raises for each superintendent of \$8,000 to \$11,000 per year.

CUPE Local 3166 questions the economic feasibility of this decision. In the past decade statistics clearly indicate that corporations adopting this slash and burn philosophy have not prospered, while corporations which maintained their work force have, in the end, been more competitive and provide superior quality services.

The members of Local 3166 answer the phone when the taxpayer calls. We are the secretaries in the schools your child attends. We are the front line people who meet, greet, comfort, inform and assist. We are the cogs that make the big wheel turn. While laying off these workers the board did not eliminate one senior staff position.

This board has adopted a completely callous attitude towards their employees and created a hostile atmosphere for their workers: We no longer have a caring Christian community in which to work. The Catholic taxpayers of Halton should take a good hard look at exactly where their tax dollars are being spent and respond appropriately.

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
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
