Police Blotter Sparling says watch out next time when it comes to tax cut

Oakville regional Councillor Stephen Sparling said he will insist on better accounting of tax savings for future Halton programs and contracts.

When Halton Region's four municipalities agreed on hiring one company to collect garbage, \$1 million in savings was supposed to be delivered to taxpayers on their local tax bill. It did not happen.

According to Mr. Sparling, chair of Halton's planning and public

works committee, it was agreed by council that the savings would be reflected on this year's tax bill, but the windfall was eaten up by provincial grant reductions and used to help maintain budgets.

"We are offering less service so we should show the corresponding savings," said Mr. Sparling. "It was used to cover shortfalls. The taxpayer didn't get the savings passed

Mr. Sparling said he would keep an eye on local and regional council in the future to ensure promises

of this sort are kept.

"Unfortunately this is a done deal with-the savings on garbage. It's one of those things that slipped through," he said, promising to be more vigilant. "These issues will come up again in the future and I'll be watching them like a hawk. There have to be real reductions in
