Ms Kovachik-MacNeil graduated as a registered nurse in 1973 and after a stint at Toronto General Hospital, took a position on a First Nations Reserve in Cross Lake, Ontario. Other northern postings followed in Nelson House, Manitoba and Sandy Lake, Ontario.

Sandy Lake is nearest to, but far from dors when assessing medical complaints. Red Lake," she said, remembering the feeling of working in such remote areas. The north changed my life forever — the northern lights, and stars stretching across the sky like you have never seen."

Other northern included several in the high Arctic, where Ms Kovachik-MacNeil experienced 24 hours of sunlight and 24 hours of darkness. She flew on a medical evacuation mission with Martin Hartwell. a pilot accused of cannibalism while he clung to life after a remote plane crash, and later immortalized in a Stompin- Tom Conners song.

"People of the north have a great respect MacNeil. "In the north I have seen the tragedy of drowning and the excitement of newborns."

After a plane crashed, claiming the life of the pilot, patient and one of her colleagues Ms. Kovachik-MacNeil decided to return-to her life in southern Ontario. She married Glenn MacNeil, currently a vice president of Everest Reinsurance Company, in 1988.

Now she lectures to nurses, general prac-

ing the human body in emergency situations, and as part of on-going health maintenance. Her specialty is primary health care with a focus on wellness and preventative medicine.
