Entrepreneur Ken Gulak builds a better mousetrap

HEN MILTON'S KEN GULAK first brought home pet rabbit Willy for his seven-year-old son Ben last year, he would never have imagined that the furry little creature would spark an idea for a new product.

Or for that matter, that this creation would ignite such an interest and subsequent demand across the North American marketplace.

That's exactly what happened however, when Mr. Gulak first went to some local pet stores to purchase a rabbit cage. "I went to some pet stores and basically this 12 by 24 inch square cage was all that was available," he recalled.

Despite not having much prior building experience, he immediately set to work constructing a more spacious cage for the animal. It wasn't long after he decided to build a cage that the idea for the rolling rabbit cage was born.

He figured such a cage would allow Willy to roam more freely and get some fresh air and exercise on the family's farm. He originally constructed the cage with plywood at both ends and chicken wire for

the base, but later replaced the plywood with more lightweight wire.

It wasn't long after the first model was finished that a number of friends saw it and relayed their interest to him. "Friends would come over, see Willy in his cage and saw 'Hey, that's great. Can you make me one?'," Mr. Gulak recalled. "One friend said he thought I had a saleable product and that starting me thinking."

This simple comment was perhaps the final spark that created Sylken Industries and its rolling rabbit cage product.

With the help of another friend with media arts experience, Mr. Gulak set to work taking photographs and making a video of his new product. He said seeing the movement of the cage is really the key.

He sent in videos to various pet stores throughout the Greater Toronto Area and received enthusiastic response from owners and patrons. However, there was yet another step to go before the cages hit the stands.

"You can't just walk into a store and start selling a product. What I learned is that there are channels in business and that those channels are there for a reason.

"I took the cage to fellow Miltonian
