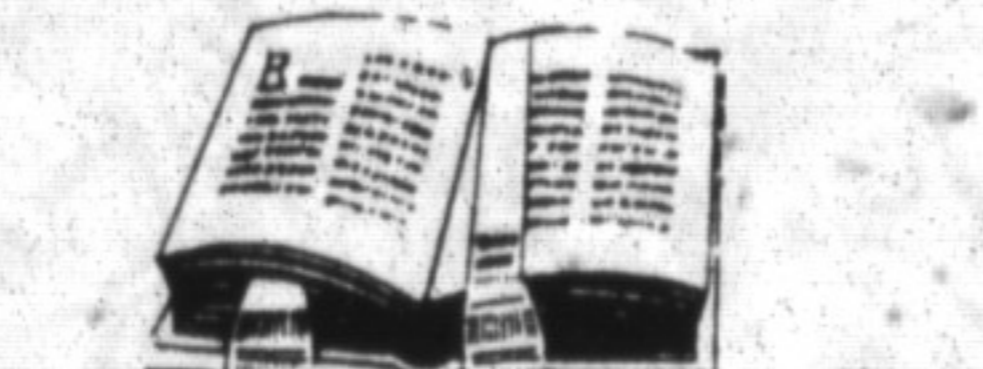

of unilateral action and its refusal to acknowledge that the demand for medical services far outstrips funding," he says. "Unfortunately, many doctors are being forced to limit the medical services they provide in order to fit the government's budget for patient care."

The government is failing to fund all the medical services Ontarians need and expect, Dr. Rowland says. He says the Ministry of Health's own figures estimate that the amount of medical care patients will receive this year will exceed the government's budget by more than \$500 million.

"If the government is not prepared to fund these services, no one can expect physicians to provide them for free." This year's budget for medical services is \$138 million less than what was spent in 1992, according to the OMA. Since then, the Ontario population has grown by 700,000 and the number of people over 65 - when medical needs typically increase - has grown by 140,000.

Ministry actions that have led to the impending crisis include the recent imposition of billing thresholds and a continuing clawback on physician billings for services already provided, Dr. Rowland says.

"We have heard of many situations where doctors are no longer able to provide the level of care their patients are seeking. For instance, if a family doctor works extra time in an understaffed emergency ward, he or she risks reaching their billing threshold, which would jeopardize their ability to provide care to their own patients."

Doctors are earning less money, but "our overhead still stays the same," Dr. Maley says, adding that he was recently forced to close his Campbellville office - laying off three people - and now operates solely off Main Street.

The OMA hopes talks with government over the last several weeks will lead to reforms and funding.

In the meantime, Dr. Maley says the situation is putting dangerously high levels of stress on physicians - another factor doctors must take into consideration.

"I have to think about my own health and my family," he says.
