

## More bickering over development charges

Development charges should reflect the true cost of development, according to Oakville regional Councillor Keith Bird.

Mr. Bird told members of Halton's administration and finance committee recently that keeping development charges competitive with other municipalities is a mistake in perception. He said that a house in Oakville, despite lower development charges, cost \$5,000 more than an identical home, built by the same builder, in Pickering. Development charges in Pickering are higher than those in Oakville.

He said the cost of the homes is based on what the builder felt the market could bear, rather than simply the cost of building the home.

Committee members were debating a number of provisions relating to development charges in Halton. They deferred the bulk of the discussion to allow the public to address the issue.

While most committee members were concerned with keeping the development charges competitive with other municipalities, Mr. Bird refused to acquiesce and said they should be tied to the real cost of developing property.

"We always knew there was a cost to development but Oakville's study showed the town was grossly undercharging by half, or about \$5,000," he said.

Oakville Councillor Kevin Flynn agreed, saying existing residents are paying substantially for the costs of growth which was thrust upon Oakville by the Ontario Municipal Board.

"Oakville started charging too late and not charging enough, therefore existing ratepayers are shouldering the burden of growth," he said. "It's our mistake, we didn't vote for it soon enough."

Acting Halton chief administrative officer Joe Rinaldo said "Development charges are under attack all around the province." The province is conducting a review of development charges but has issued no time frame for its report.
