# Milton teams disappointed

#### Lack of consistency lack of players dog the two local schools

The Bishop Reding Royals and Milton District High School Mustangs faced different obstacles that led to similarly disappointing endings at last weekend's Reding Invitational Junior Girls Basketball Tournament.

The host Royals suffered from opening game jitters in their first round-robin match against the Loyola Hawks, particularly with the noon-hour contest drawing extra supporters and causing what head coach Bob Surge felt might have been too much pressure for the local squad.

The Hawks capitalized on this with a 53-37 victory. "We should never have lost by that much to Loyola," said Surge. His team recovered in game two with a solid 43-28 triumph over the Assumption Crusaders. Despite a solid effort in their final round-robin game, the Royals fell 46-37 to the Notre Dame Irish. The loss also dropped them from playoff contention.

Although his team showed glaring signs of inconsistency as well as tournament jitters, Surge cited big performances from a trio of players, including top shooter Jaclyn Hunt.

The second-year junior turned in a mini offensive clinic all weekend with 41 points, 22 of which came in a stellar effort against Assumption. She was particularly strong from the foul line with over a dozen baskets.

Alana Ramsay was another veteran who led the team's scoring efforts. She sank 13 points in the loss to Loyola and collected eight in the first half of the Irish game to keep them in the hunt. Rookie Joanna Sitarz was also impressive, especially in the final game when she chalked up eight points.

The Mustangs didn't so much suffer from a lack of consistency as they did simply from a lack of players. With star pointguard Melanie Casson unavailable all weekend and teammates Chrissie Henderson and Jen McManus out for their final game, MD couldn't quite mount the type of firepower that has made them successful in the league play.

They started off with a relatively easy 42-13 win over crosstown rival E.C. Drury, but then went down to both Lester B. Pearson (47-42) and Father Michael Goetz of Guelph (41-28).

"We had trouble shooting in the Pearson game and missed lay-ups throughout. We simply had a lack of offense this weekend," said Mustangs skipper Ulana Price.

Anchoring her team's scoring punch was Amy Hall-McLaughlin, who hit for double-digits in all three games while Sam Kindree provide great defensive pressure and Henderson, Mandy McCollum, Carmen Smeitink and Erin Walsh also came up with solid efforts.

Pearson went on to win the tournament with a 43-28 decision


