John Snobelen, predicted the result will be a reduced number of boards.

There are 182 school boards now, and a special report issued last year recommended cutting down to 82, to eliminate duplication.

Some of Mr. Young's comments were challenged by Fred Sweeney, director of the Halton Roman Catholic School Board.

"I think it's false to say our students finish in the middle in international tests," said Mr. Sweeney. Other nations separate their students earlier based on performance, so not all theirs were tested, he noted.

He blamed the province for a rapid decline in funding its portion of education, while increasing the burden on the school board level.

Subsidies have dropped from 60 per cent in 1979, to 37 per cent today, while provincial legislation has demanded more services from school boards, he said.

Mr. Sweeney said his board has lowered its costs for maintenance, eliminated etirement gratuities for teachers and operated with a lean budget.

Bob Williams, director the Halton public board, said drops in provincial funding will force trustees to pass a 12 per cent tax hike or find another \$24 million in cuts. That's about 10 per cent of the budget, most of which is made up of negotiated salaries.

"Clearly, the solutions are going to come from the province, not the local boards," said Mr. Williams, adding the province should move soon, to eliminate the uncertainties. "The situation certainly is demoralizing to my staff."
