His mound performance anchored the Metro squad to wins over St. John's. Victoria, Calgary, Peterborough and Dresden before losing to Brantford Nissan in the gold medal round. "It (the national helped bring home silver-medal honors tournament) was exciting as hell. We all

had a tremendous time," Fascinato added.

Patrolling the outfield was Brooks, who like Fascinato played many years of fastball before switching over to slo-pitch. The tion. Hoard was a steady contributor at the plate and next to Brooks in the outfield.

Fascinato is already thinking about another big performance at next year's nationals. He's hoping to be part of the team that goes for another medal in Vancouver.
