Protesting docs all over the map

With one self-imposed deadline passed and no agreement between the provincial government and Ontario's doctors, physicians are stepping up the pressure. However, given the fractious-nature of physician groups, there appears to be no coordinated strategy for job actions.

Negotiators were working toward a Dec. 6 deadline, which passed with no deal announced. Ontario doctors are unhappy with billing caps, clawbacks of billings for services already performed, and provincial government proposals to restrict where doctors can practice.

According to Milton's Dr. Garnet Maley, president of the Halton Medical Society, some groups representing doctors are calling for physicians to close their offices this Friday (Dec. 13). He added the Ontario Medical Association (OMA), from which several of these groups have splintered, will announce its preferred job action later this week with a target date of Dec. 20.

Dr. Maley said he in takes his direction from the general and family practice section of the OMA.

The Specialists Coalition of Ontario, representing doctors most affected by provincial government billing caps and other proposals, have called for physicians to close their doors Friday, according to Dr. Maley. He added the Coalition of Family Physicians of Ontario, which he called a splinter group of the OMA, also called for Friday office closures.

Dr. Maley was unable to provide any numbers as to local physicians who might be complying with these calls for job action.

According to Dr. Sharla Lichtman, cochair of the Coaltion of Family Physicians of Ontario, demands on the health care system have increased 12 per cent over the last four years due to population growth, aging and new technology. Health care funds have remained frozen at 1992 levels, she said. The coalition plans to announce further job actions in the near future:
