employees, members of the Service Employees International Union (SEIU), had been locked out since February in a heated labour dispute that involved a court injunction and job termination notices to three workers.

JUNE

 Two Milton public elementary schools According to Halton Board of Education Trustee Tim Kingsbury, both Percy W. Merry and Martin Street schools were put on a short list of nine in Halton Region to be studied, with an eye to shutting them. Mr. Kingsbury said the condition of each building and size of the student populations were the chief factors in whether the schools would remain open.

· The fourth fire set at Milton District High School in six months sent smoke billowing through a hallway, prompting the evacuation of the building. Last period classes were cancelled and about a dozen firefighters were called to the scene of the blaze, which police said was set in an unlocked locker. Despite an alert student's attempt to douse the flames with a fire extinguisher, fire spread to four lockers, warping the metal frames and destroying clothing and books.

The action was taken in response to a letter in which the Power Workers' Union told management they would "call a strike only when it is most appropriate to the needs of the members of the bargaining unit." Locked out hydro workers became upset with hydro commissioners for refusing to meet with them to discuss their ongoing labour disputes, while each side began blaming the other as incidents of violence were reported on the picket lines.
