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Price of GO ticket may get much more expensive

Riding a GO train may be dramatically more expensive soon.

Recent announcements in funding shifts between the province and municipalities will put \$28.2 million of the tab for GO Transit on Halton property taxpayers' bills. That expense could be shifted to riders through increased ticket prices.

Halton officials feel the new GO Transit obligations will be offset by the province's commitment to pay for the bulk of education, which Halton taxpayers financed at \$199 million last year.

According to Halton Region's new chief administrative officer Barry Malmsten, the estimate for GO Transit costs in Halton is based on ridership from Halton stations divided into the total provincial subsidy for the service.

The only way that bill could be covered is by local How taxpayers picking it up, another level of government able, stepping in or a hike in ticket prices, he said.

Currently the province subsidizes about 40 per cent of the average GO ride, according to Joe Rinaldo,

Haltoh's commissioner of corporate services.

GO Transit funding is one of the central issues facing the new Greater Toronto Services Board (GTSB),
which is supposed to report in February on its plan to
provide services which are shared across the Greater
Toronto Area (GTA). However, Mr. Malmsten pointed out that the second largest users of the system, residents of Simcoe County (Barrie) are not in the GTA
and are not covered by the GTSB.

According to Halton senior policy advisor Rob.

Rossini the province spends \$123 million on GO

Transit and Halton accounts for about 22 per cent of the ridership on the system.

There are several GO rail stations in Halton but they also serve commuters from outside the region, said Mr. Malmsten.

Mr. Malmsten agreed that a municipal subsidy for capital costs, coupled with a ticket increase to cover operating expenses, might be the preferred option. The However, a financial breakdown is not readily available.

"More than 190,000 people a day use GO and we cannot afford to build the highways to take up the slack if the service was discontinued," he said.
