# Elusive quest for Silver Stick

The International Silver Stick Tournament held a bittersweet ending for the Lions Club major bantam AA Winterhawks last month in Port Huron.

While bowing out to the eventual champions, Michigan's Sault Ste. Marie, a one-goal decision left them wondering if the coveted 'Silver Stick' had been theirs for the taking.

There's two schools of thought in a case like this. One is the positive outlook that we lost to the best, but on the other hand if we had worked a little harder we could have won the whole thing," said manager James Heffron, whose team qualified with a silver medal performance at the November Silver Stick Regional in Clarington.

Milton provided the Soo with perhaps the strongest competition of the tournament, and in fact led their final round-robin tilt until late in the third. The 1-1 deadlock was broken in overtime.

Trevor Saliba worked the cage for the 'Hawks, with Jon Sprenger registering their lone tally in the opening frame.

Two well-rounded efforts produced 4-1 and 3-1 wins over Detroit, Michigan and Vail, Colorado respectively in early tournament play.

The Lions jumped out to a quick three-goal lead in game one—thanks to Sprenger, Dan Bonham and Jason Ford—and hung on for the victory. Saliba was sharp between the pipes.

The big line of Chris Bramwell, Paul Pento and Kevin Heffron, combined for a pair of first-period goals to help dump Vail. Goaltender Jamie Funnell turned aside 21 shots, where his teammates managed only a dozen.

Jeff Seeds held the hot stick for the 'Hawks with a third-period hattrick while Jeff Chaisson helped set up all three goals. Steve Szafer and Adam Rooke pumped in secondperiod markers after a scoreless opening frame, Assists went to Cory Leigh, Paul Loader and Ben Wilson, with netminder Kyle Garon stopping 20 of 21 shots.
