The role of professional grappler Tiger Jeet Singh in a fraudulent Edmonton real estate deal has once again been questioned in a Milton courtroom.

A defence lawyer suggested the wrestling mogul - whose real name is Jagjit Singh Hans - should have faced trial with Bahadur Singh Toor, 47, and Narinder Dev Sood, 59.

Instead, Mr. Toor - Mr. Hans' brother-in-law - and Mr. Sood were left holding the bag, Ross Lundy told Ontario Court (general division) in-Milton earlier this month.

Mr. Hans tells a far different story, saying he was

duped by others and has a paper trail to back that assertion up.

Mr. Toor was handed a 12month prison sentence and Mr. Sood was given two years less a day in connection with the purchase of the townhouse complex Rundle Park Village.

Both were convicted of 'defrauding the public and conspiracy to commit fraud over \$5,000 in January following a three-week trial last year.

The loss to investors including two local men - in the scheme totalled more than \$500,000 from 1989 to 1991.

Mr. Toor and Mr. Sood, realtors for the Sutton Group in Brampton at the time, were try-
