The four winning teams (one from each school) met at the mall last week to showcase their creations. The event was organized by the youth subcommittee of the Milton Community Group to Prevent Substance Abuse, commonly known as PREVENT. More than 50 people were on hand to sample the concoctions.

"It went really, really well," said Jana Proctor, chair of the sub-

committee. "I didn't expect this many people to show up. I think we really did get the message across." That message, said Jana, is that alcohol is not needed to have a good time.

Many community representatives, including Mayor Gord Krantz, Fire Chief Harold Penson, and councilors Ron Furik and Colin Best were on hand to sample the libations.

While the event served to publicly acknowledge the efforts of the winners and spread a message of safe party celebration, the organizers are hoping more was achieved.

"We want to make the public aware that teenagers can have fun without alcohol," said Jana.

The four teams will next meet on Tuesday, April 29 in Burlington at the Halton Ultimate Mix. This event, hosted by the Canadian Automobile Association, will pit the four Milton groups against teams from across Halton. The event was created by the non-profit group Men Walking Against Male walk to raise money. Seventy per-cent of Street and south to Milton District.



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
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




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
