The following descriptions were written by children in the

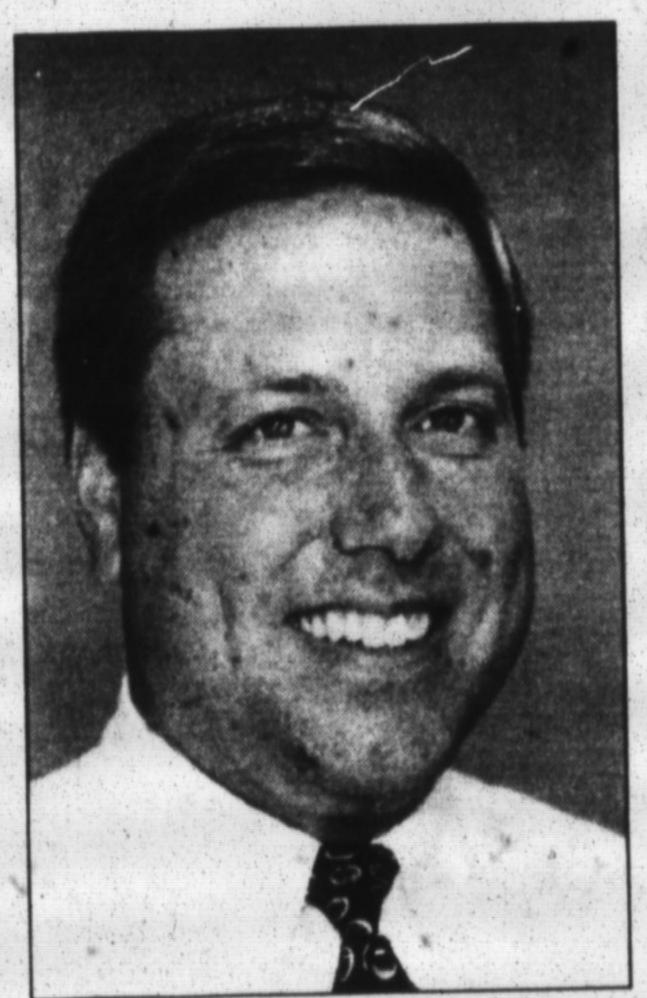
program about their volunteer "friends":

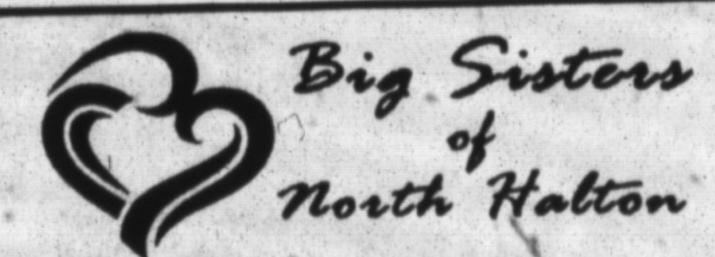
