During the week of Aug. 6-11, the Milton Tennis Club will host the boys and girls under 16 and under 18 age group events for the Ontario Junior Open Tennis Championships. This tournament is one of Canada's premier tennis attractions featuring the country's top three or four juniors from each province.

Ontario will be represented in under-18 play by the province's three top juniors, No.-1 ranked Andrew Sznajder, secondranked Richard Robinson of Toronto and third-ranked Mark Greenan of Guelph.

Sznajder was ranked second nationally in under-18 play in 1983 while Greenan was eighth and Robinson 10th.

Sznajder and Robinson, both 17, are members of the 1984 Canadian junior team which recently returned from two months of competition in Europe and South America. The players competed in the junior Italian, French and Wimbledon championships and Sznajder won a major tournament, the Astrid Bowl, in Belgium. He is ranked 15th in the world.

Also competing on the team and at the Ontario Open are 15-year old Kathy Sipos, of Toronto, the nation's top-ranked under-14 girl in 1983.

All four players are competing this week in the national closed championships for

men and women in Ottawa. Immediately following the Ontario

Open, most players will take part in the national junior championships Aug. 13-18. Both singles and doubles events will be played here and the draw for singles is limited to 32 entrants so the field will be


