Herd dispersal draws 600

It is not often that 600 people visit a dairy farm in one day but that

number showed up at Jeff Nurse's Thursday.

The Holstein breeder sold 96 cattle by auction last week, which represented most of his pure-bred herd. Mr. Nurse started his own

herd after his father's dispersal sale in 1978. There was some activity at Monteith Holsteins the night before the sale when two heifers (females) were born, one of them with red and white markings. A third heifer was delivered hours before

the auction began. Those who bid on the pedigree cattle came from as far away as

New Brunswick, Saskatchewan, Wisconsin and northern Quebec. According to Mr. Nurse, once a breeder has developed a certain amount of pedigree it is time to sell. Usually a pedigree is extended to third generation but some of his stock was fifth generation.

The operator of the Trafalgar Rd. farm kept a couple of his older cows and willnow be looking for some sturdy stock to begin developing another herd.

His Holstein sale took place the day after a large gathering of Holstein breeders at the Ontario Agricultural Museum. The crowd of 2,000 were celebrating 100 years of Holstein heritage Wednesday with a parade, picnic and speakers.

Ontario Historical Society, founded in 1888, has strived to maintain the historical and cultural heritage of Ontario for the last 96 years through a variety of programmes and projects.




