Hamstring pull keeps lan James from Olympics

Almost four hard years have passed since Ian James set his sights on the 1984 Olympic Games. Now 21 years of age, the young Milton athlete has worked hard in his speciality of the long jump. World-class calibre, James was seen by many as a

sure bet for these Games. However, a year-long troubling hamstring injury will prevent the likeable E.C. Drury graduate from taking part this year. And he's taken it all in stride.

"This has been an up-and-down year for me," says James. "I was pre-selected for the Canadian Olympic team but I pulled it (the hamstring) pretty bad.

James went to Winnipeg anyway in the first week of July to attempt to compete for a spot on the team Although he tried acupuncture to alleviate the pain, he could jump just 7.40 metres, far from his personal best of 7.83, and has had to view the Games from his television set.

"I'm young. I've got lots of time. The prime age for a long jumper is 25 or 26 years of age. I'm look-

ing toward next year to be a good year for me." This is the second straight year a hamstring pull has stopped him from competing in a major meet. A year ago, he pulled the muscle just one day after his plane landed in Germany en route to the World Championships in Helsinki, Finland and couldn't compete.

Next year promises to bring many changes to his life. A recent graduate from Seneca College in the recreational management program, James is looking for a job.

His training now involves rehabiltating his muscle before rigorous training begins in September. After that, he'll take aim at the Pan-Am Pacific Games in California, the World Student Games in Japan, and finally the World Cup in Australia in

October. The Olympic long jump has involved some special performances. In 1936, Jesse Owens jumped 8.06 metres to win one of four gold medals. The record stood for 20 years which considering the gravel running track and metal spikes (unlike)

more modern equipment) is almost unbelievable. Then in 1968, Bob Beamon leaped 29 feet 2 inches, which translates into 8:90. That mark still stands as the world and Olympic records.

This year, Carl Lewis is rated to win four gold medals including the long jump. Lewis has jumped in the 8.50 range while most of his competitors are in the 8.20 range.

That 8.20 range is the target James and his coach Zoltan Tinke had set and James was on target this year. Only the hamstring pulls have slowed him.

Most of the best junior tennis players Canada has to offer will find themselves spending the next week inside the confines of the Milton Tennis Club's courts.

The Ontario Open, one in a series of major national tennis championships, starts Monday and runs through to Saturday featuring some top-quality tennis.

Included in the list of players is Andrew Sznajder, a brassy 17-year-old who is rated the top junior in the country. Sznajder recently competed in the national championships where he lost in the quarters to Martin Wolstenholme, now of Oakville, who advanced to the finals before losing to Stefan Bonneau.

Admission is free and if you want to see competition of any sport at its best, you might just want to take in a few matches. These kids are about as competitive as you'll ever see and make some hockey players look like pussy cats.
