Arthritis '84 goal set

Milton's branch of the Arthritis Society will wage a public campaign for funds starting Monday, Sept. 10 and this year's target is \$8,300, Campaign Chairman Audrea Lear-Costigan told a meeting of zone chairmen and canvassers Wednesday.

Last fall the group had a goal of \$7,000 and managed to collect a record \$8,800, she reported. "We hope our campaign is just as successful this year," Mrs. Lear-Costigan

Urban Milton has been sectioned into five zones and the zone chairmen this year will be Alex McNiven, Irene Chesla, Jack Jamieson and Marjorie Powys, with one more chairman to be named this week. Canvasser kits, posters and donation jars will all be in place by the campaign kick-off on Sept. 10, she said.

Mauri Vallee, Director of Field Services for The Arthritis Society, attended the meeting to show the new film Frontiers in Research which shows where much of the association's money goes.

Mr. Valley said 30,000 children under the age of 12 (roughly equivalent to the population of Milton) are suffering with arthritis across Canada.

Mrs. Lear-Costigan gave a report on the annual regional meeting held recently in Cambridge, where 1983 revenue was reported as \$5.695 million. The Ontario division's 1984 budget is \$5.882 million.

"Much progress has been made in the treatment of arthritis over the past 10 years and researchers are on the threshold of finding the keys that will bring arthritis under control," she predicted.

In Canada it is our number-one chronic disease. Arthritis costs over \$1 million a year in daily medication alone, she said.

"People with arthritis lose more than \$1 billion a year in lost wages, which costs the federal government \$150 million in tax revenues," she said.


