

Remax holds edge in battle for first place

After 16 weeks and 20 games, you'd think that the Milton Men's O.V. Slo-Pitch League would have settled into a safe pattern of winners and losers, and that the league standings would be pretty well established.

But as we head into the final week of regular-season play, the only three spots that are spoken for are at the bottom end—Dickens has a lock on sixth, Milton Colour and Sound is safely in seventh, and our buddies from D & S Signs have found a home in the basement.

The first five spots, however, are still up for grabs. Remax Realty and Frankel Steel are deadlocked at the top of the heap with identical 12-6-2 records. If they both win, or both lose, this week, Remax claims the number-one position by virtue of a better season record against Frankel. The Steelers only hope is to have Remax lose their match-up with Colour and Sound while Frankel defeats Halton Alarm.

Cheers is currently sitting in third spot, 1/2 game up on St. Clair. St. Clair plays a doubleheader this week against The Dickens and if they win both, they can move into a tie with Cheers, assuming Cheers wins their

game against D & S.

If, on the other hand, St. Clair loses both and Halton Alarm beats Frankel, the Alarmers overtake the Paint and Paper people and move into fourth spot.

As you can see, there are a number of possibilities which have to be determined before the play-off situation can be finalized.

Playoffs will begin Monday. They will be played in a round-robin format with teams grouped into two divisions. Division 'A' will include the first, fourth, fifth, and eighth place finishers in the regular season; Division 'B' will be made up of the teams who finished second, third, sixth and seventh.

Each team will play three games within their own division, with two of the games taking place during the weeks of Sept. 3 and Sept. 10. The final round-robin game for each team will be played Sept. 15 at Rotary Park. The teams emerging victorious from each division will then meet for the Championship, while the runner-up in each division will meet in the Consolation Final. Championship and consolation finals will also be played at Rotary Park on Sept. 15.

In last week's action, St. Clair prevented Remax from clinching the pennant, upen-

ding the Realtors 17-16. Howie Pfeiffer did most of the damage for the paper-hangers, banging out two home runs and a triple among his four hits. Dave Adams and Mike Barbetta also added some punch to the offence as each hit safely three times.

For Remax, Fred Bakes, Gary Thomas, and Bob Cameron all had four hit outings.

In one of this year's tighter games, Cheers Restaurant squeaked out a 6-3 decision over Halton Alarm. Dave Bousfield, Glenn Brags, Pat McCann, YHR, and Al Bryant all had three-hit evenings for Cheers, but Bryant's bat was the most impressive as he included a key two-run homer among his safeties.

For the Bell-ringers, Brent MacArthur, Dan Davis, Brian Gildea, and Bob Kolbuc were the most offensive.

In other games, D & S Signs split a pair, dropping a lopsided contest to The Dickens before bouncing back to decision Milton Colour and Sound. The loss to D & S was the second losing effort of the week for MCS as they were also defeated by Frankel.

Losing games was the least of Colour and Sound's problems last week. They were doing more damage to themselves than

their opposition was. John Burtwistle and Chuck Parker decided to have a short meeting in the outfield—the only problem was, they had not intended to meet while running at full speed! 






