Fund now near \$1,162,000 mark

Although the campaign officially ended Sept. 29 with a total of \$1,126,682, the Milton District Hospital expansion fund continues to grow. As of this week it had reached \$1,161,995, or 16 per cent above its initial \$1,000,000 goal, reports Bruce Dolson, Campaign Chairman.

Much of the money received in the past six weeks has been unexpected money, he said. Brick sales are still continuing, with about 1,050 sold to date.

Among the recent donors:
■ The Optimist Club of Milton has turned over \$10,250, the total proceeds of the 1984 Chevette car draw that culminated at Milton Fall Fair. The car was donated by Richardson Chev-Olds and tickets were sold by the Optimist Club.

■ Milton Lions Club has donated a further \$10,000 on top of the \$40,000 presented earlier from the club's house draw.

■ Campbellville and District Lions Club had pledged \$5,000 over a two-year period, but the Lions went one better. They raised \$6,682.18, and they did it in one year from a variety of fund-raising projects.

■ Royal Canadian Legion Joe Waters Br. 136 of Milton had helped kick off the hospital campaign over a year ago, with a \$7,000 donation. This fall the Legion members swelled that total to \$12,000 with a further \$5,000 donation. The money will be used to furnish a ward room.

■ Milton Festival of Countries decided not to run a fall festival this year, and cleaned out its bank account of \$5,000 to make a donation to the hospital. A fracture room in the emergency department will be furnished with the gift.

■ Milton Fire Department and Women's Auxiliary turned over the proceeds of the 1984 Ontario Firefighters' Convention to the hospital, to furnish a room in memory of several former firefighters. The donation included a lucky draw, the auxiliary's souvenir sales, a souvenir program and general revenue from the convention, said Fire Chief Jim Coulson. Earlier the fire department had donated a total of \$2,000, bringing their overall total to \$7,000.

■ A Thrift Shop operating at St. Paul's United Church every second Thursday morning has been a real money-maker for the 10 volunteer women who run it as a community service. They recently donated \$2,200 to the hospital, buying an ultrasound bed. Over the past six years the group has donated \$12,070 to the hospital from the sale of good used clothing, toys, books and white elephant articles.

■ Milton Soccer Association and the Soccer Referees are also supporting the hospital expansion. Between them and fans at a recent game in memory of former soccer official Werner Bauer, they turned in over \$400 to purchase two overbed tables in the expansion.

■ A "Battle of the Rock Bands" at Milton District High School brought in a profit of \$542. Janine Chung represented the organizers in presenting a cheque last week to the hospital's Youth Committee Chairman Morley Richardson. A week earlier Mr. Richardson had visited the school to receive a gift of \$100 from a business class-hamburger day! The combined effort bought three \$200 bricks.

■ Every year Colonel Harland Sanders Charitable Foundation gives a portion of its profits to local communities, through its Kentucky Fried Chicken stores. This year the hospital was the winner as Milton store manager Barb Cordy presented a cheque for \$550.

■ Last summer Gary Coulter won a \$180 BMX racing bike in a draw at Clements Motors, but he donated it to the campaign for a second draw. Tickets were sold at North End Datsun through the summer and at Milton Fall Fair on the Sept. 21-22 weekend, raising a total profit of \$436. The bike was won by Mr. McGuire of City Wide Catering, Milton, for his son Scott, age 9.

■ Halton 4-H Clubs raised money at their annual carwash, bake sale and banquet and were able to turn over a profit of \$200 to purchase a hospital brick.

Deer hunt excellent

There are plenty of healthy deer in this area according to reports from hunters participating in the four-day controlled hunt last week.

Daryl Coulson, a contract biologist with the Ministry of Natural Resources, manned Halton's check station located at Halton Sportsman's Club. He weighed a total of 73 deer carcasses from the time the station opened last Monday at 9 a.m. until it closed four days later at 9 p.m.

"They were seeing a lot of deer," he said of hunters who brought their kills to be weighed.

There were 450 hunters in Halton sanctioned by the ministry to take part in the fifth annual hunt. Adding to that number were 75 farmers. Again this year more hunters applied to participate than are allowed for.

Mr. Coulson estimated the number of deer taken this year was slightly higher than last year when 81 were shot in Halton. He called it an "excellent week for hunting," adding the cooler weather causes deer to move more as bucks come into rut for the mating season.

"The deer are healthy. We've had a couple of mild winters and that really helped them," the biologist explained.

Some which were taken in the hunt were quite fat, a condition caused when deer feed heavily on corn, according to Mr. Coulson.

Ice blamed

Icy road conditions are blamed for a two-car accident which claimed the life of a 27-year-old Carlisle woman Monday afternoon.

Milton O.P.P. said Charleen Boudreau of Concession 12, died after the car she was riding in skidded out of control and into the path of oncoming traffic on Highway 5 east of Highway 25.

According to police the driver of the 1973 AMC Hornet, James Hutchins 34, of the same address, was travelling westbound on Highway 5 when he lost control and slid across the centre line into the eastbound path of Oakville driver Eileen Provost.

Police said the road was ice covered and it was snowing lightly at the time of the accident.

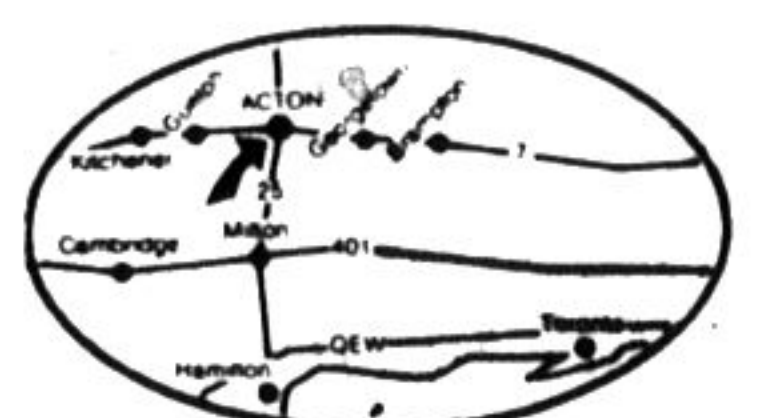
