It's back to high school for adults seeking skills

Mavis Pickering didn't realize how enjoyable high school could be until she came back as an adult student.

She is one of several older students at E.C. Drury High School, taking advantage of regular courses there.

"I got laid off and felt I had to do something," explained Mrs. Pickering.

Half of the word processing class she attends each morning is made up of adult students. According to Phil Richardson, head of the business department the course is "very practical" and produces versatile people.

"Today you need something like this and word processing seems to be the way things are going," Mrs. Pickering said.

She was nervous about going back to high school years after finishing Grade 12. Now

she would take more courses if time allowed. Math, English and senior secretarial classes have also attracted adults and next semester several women will be part of a welding class.

"We recognize this is a community school and everyone is welcome to it," said Mr. Richardson.

Adults are advised to take two courses per semester which enables them to be classed as full-time students. There is no charge for courses and almost no limit to the types of programs offered at the secondary school.

MDHS band keys up for season



The Music Department is raising funds this year by selling pure Ontario honey for only \$4 a kilogram.




