In the final period, SuperChoice made good on just one of six power-play opportunities, by Rick Chapman, but couldn't convert more to draw them closer to Straight Line.


Sandstone Transport broke a 3-3 tie with two goals a minute apart late in the second period for a lead it didn't relinquish the rest of the way.




