



Krantz blasts policy of setting programs

'Big Brother' (alias the provincial government) better pay up if it wants Halton Region to institute new public health programs, says Milton Mayor Gord Krantz.

Mr. Krantz was responding to Oakville councillor Jackie Cutmore's question on whether the region is in a "thou shalt do" position with the provincial government for hiring a dental hygienist. Mrs. Cutmore and Mr. Krantz

were annoyed that the Ontario Ministry of Health is requiring the region to start new programs and providing partial funding for them.

"We should tell Big Brother "thou shalt pay, too," said Mr. Krantz at regional health and services committee meeting

Mr. Krantz said the region often gets into such programs at the urging or insistence of the province, which initially pays 75 per cent of the costs for running the program, but eventually places the entire burden on Halton.

Mrs. Cutmore asked regional staff to clarify the ministry' stand on its "Core Programs."

She said she wanted to know if the programs requiring regions to have a dental hygienist among other things is an order or just a recommendation.

Earlier, Graham Pollett, Halton's new medical officer of health, told the committee that Halton is considered to be in violation of the provincial regulation right now by not having a dental hygienist on staff.

Dr. Sam Green, director of the dental division of the health department, said senior staff in the department are completely frustrated because the ministry is always "yelling at us."

"I get the one-two from the ministry. They ask me, "Aren't you ashamed (that this or that program isn't set up in Halton)?'

But Dr. Green said if regional council says the health department cannot have this program, "I can live with that.

The recommendation for a dental hygienist came from a health department review of the community dentistry program.

The hygienist and program would cost about \$28,000 to have in place next year.

New Year's ring-in
