Chad Perryment put the atoms in the driver's seat 55 seconds into the period. Perryment scored both Milton goals, and his linemate Brian Mallany collected two assists.

Burlington pressed Milton hard after that but the local defence fronted goaltender Jason Way effectively. Tom Baier, Mitch Robinson, Scott Doohar and Ted Halk were the blue-line border guards.

Milton went ahead 2-0 in the third but Burlington didn't plan on taking its first loss to Milton lightly. They scored late in the third and attacked strongly for the rest of the game, pulling their goalie late to capitalize on a face-off within the Milton zone. But the locals held on for the win.

Last Wednesday Fred Van Zutphen scored the lone Milton goal.

Orangeville took the lead on a scramble goal at Milton Sunday and the Diet Centre reps were forced to play catch-up hockey for the rest of the game. Perseverance paid off late in the third when Van Zutphen scored, assisted by Mallany and Halk.

Saturday, Milton faced powerful Burlington, and goalie Glenn Trickey was credited with a solid effort in keeping the score low. Burlington was working on a shutout in the third period but Beals broke that up with Milton's only goal.

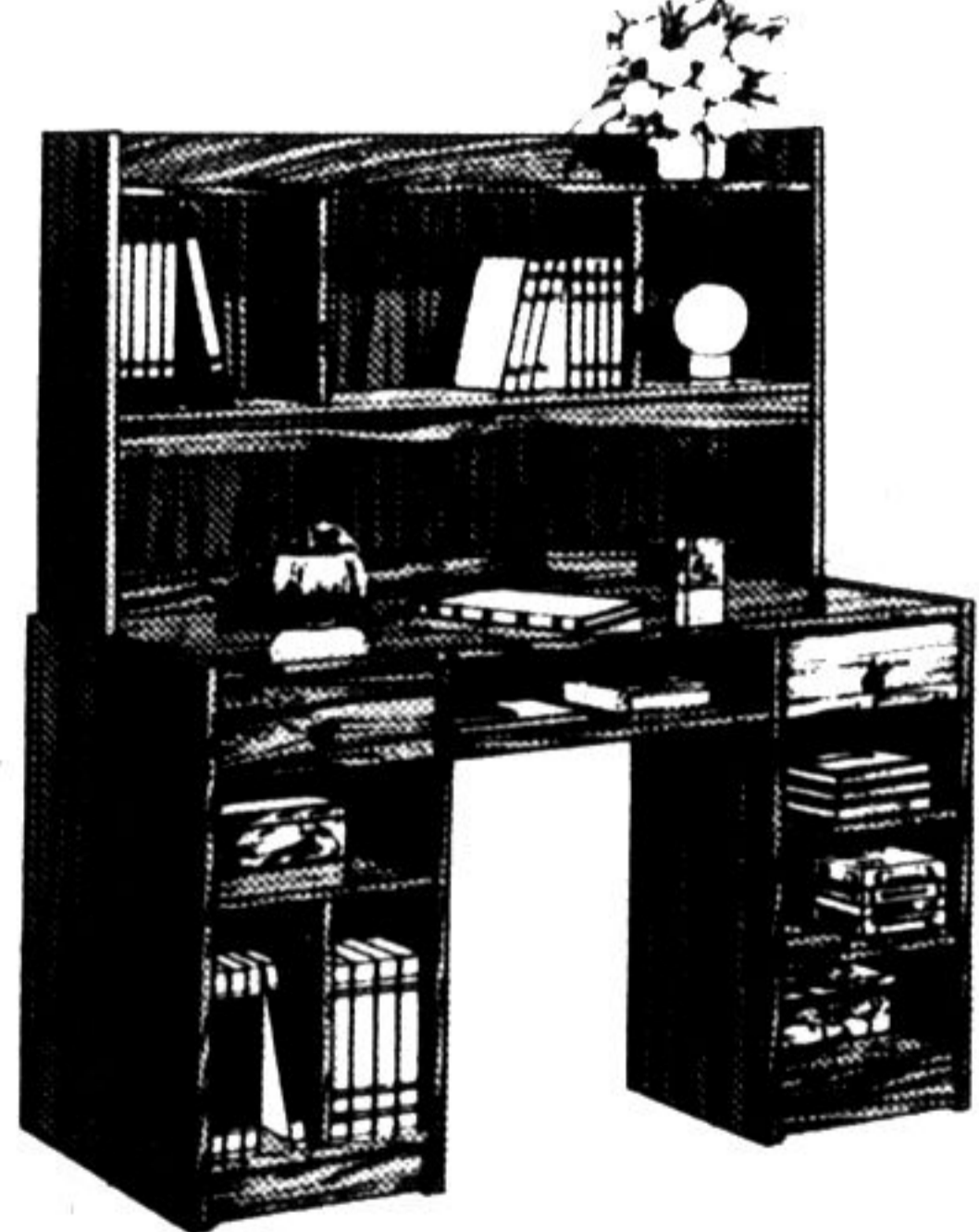
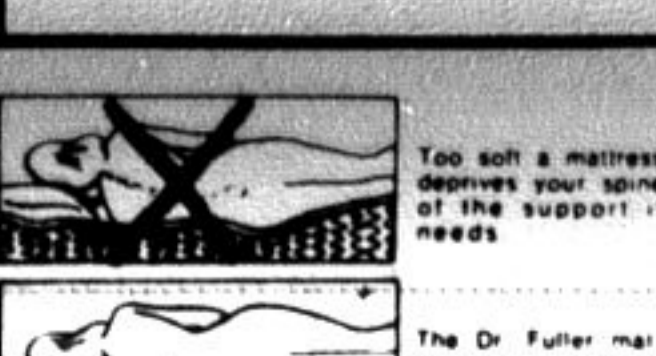

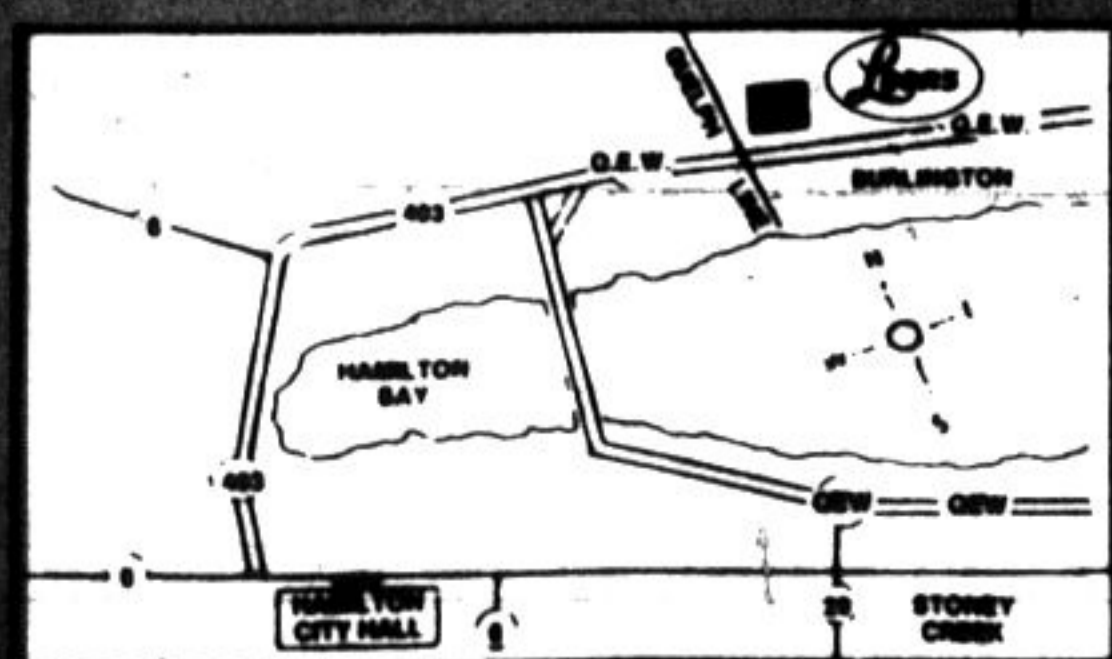
