 In the tightly played game, Haggart Crane jumped in front 1-0 with the lone goal of the opening frame. Steve Jobin fired the

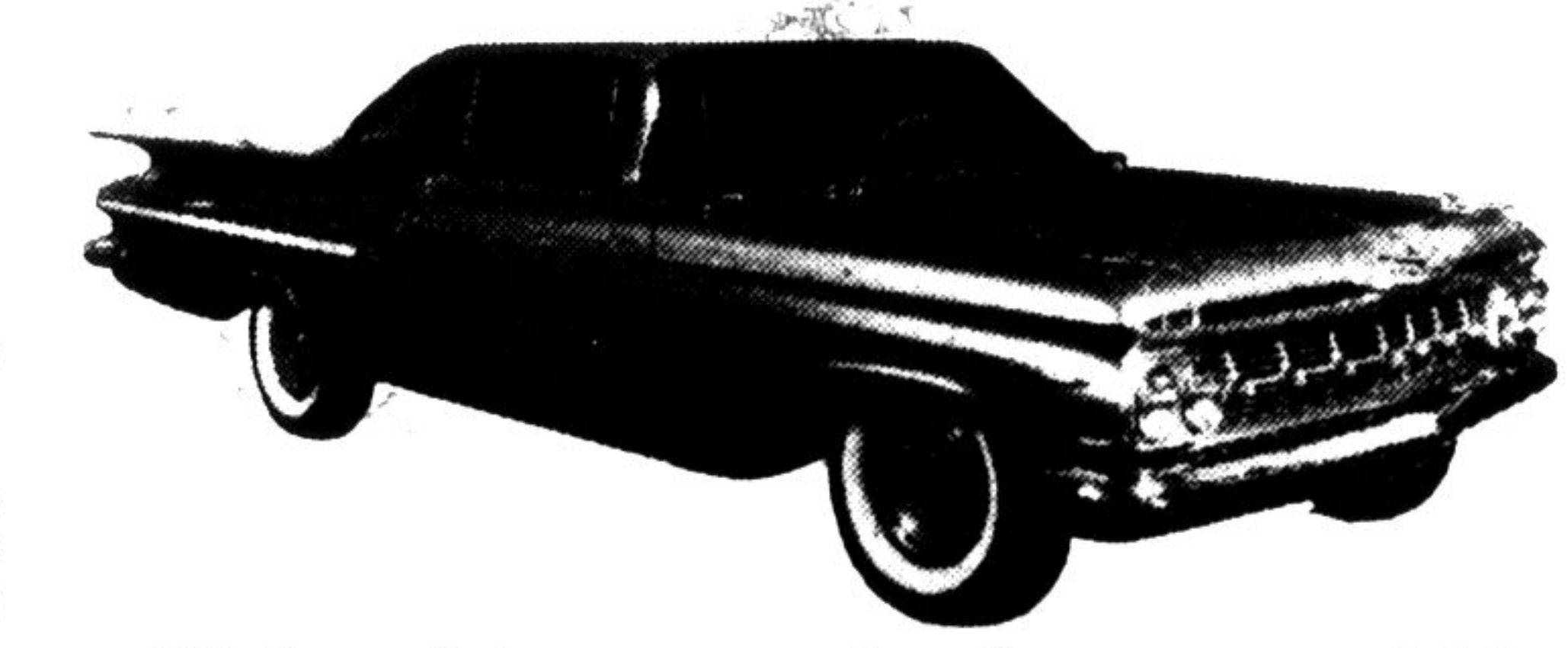

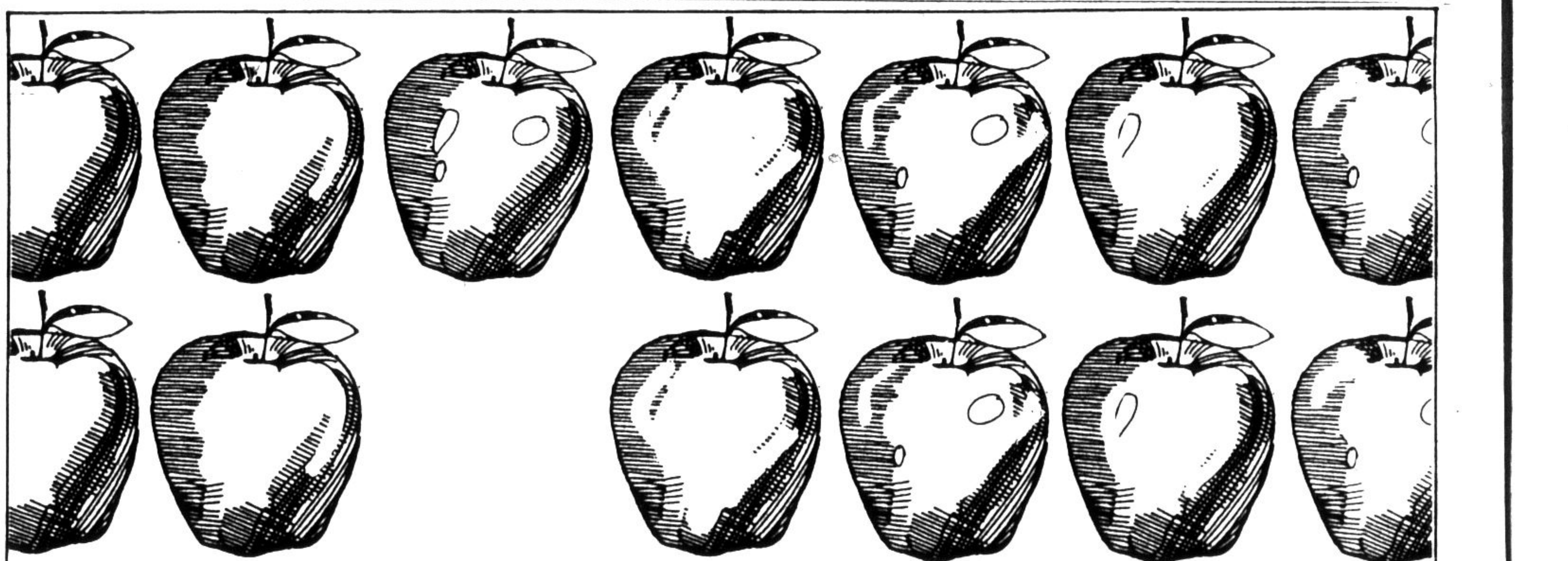
