# Meet results among the best

Looking back at last week's Central Region gymnastic meet results in detail reveals that almost all Milton competitors produced personal bests on one or more events.

Andrea Geniole's 9.3 vault was not only a personal best for the event but also the highest score any Springer has achieved on any event in a qualifying or championship meet.

In the same event, Liz Ferri's 8.7 vault was also a personal best, as was her seventh-place 8.6 floor event result. Although Joanne Keyworth won the Tyro B beam her score was not a personal best. Nevertheless Joanne has succeeded in placing in the top six in the beam event in her last four qualifying competitions. It was an extremely good achievement on the apparatus considered to make or break an individual's overall competition results.






