

# Vault work brings man \$1,600 fine

A Campbellville man has been fined \$1,600 and placed on two years probation following his conviction on charges of misrepresentation.

The charges were laid by the Association of Professional Engineers of Ontario after an investigation into Steven S. Rankin's involvement in the preparation of drawings for a proposed transformer vault for Diemaster Tool Inc., and the construction of a Mississauga tool and die plant.

Investigation proved Mr. Rankin misrepresented himself as a professional engineer both verbally and in correspondence as well as during an interview for employment with Diemaster Tool Inc., according to Alan Cagney, spokesman for the Association.

Mr. Rankin, in addition, prepared drawings for the firm, relating to the redesign of a transformer vault.

Mr. Rankin was subsequently charged and convicted under the Professional Engineers Act.

Under the conditions of the probation, he is not to commit the same or any similar offence, he must attend court as required, he must notify the court of any change of address and he is prohibited from using the term "professional engineer" or any abbreviation for the period of his probation unless he should become a member or licensee of the APEO.

# We've got to change -Pomeroy

Halton Region is viewed with scepticism by many residents and that must be changed according to the region's newest chairman, Peter Pomeroy.

In one of his first official speaking engagements since becoming chairman, Mr. Pomeroy told a meeting of the Milton Chamber of Commerce he is fully aware the public perception of regionalism is not what it should be.

He said the problem with finances and other problem areas he did not specify have turned people off.

Communication is not what it could have been, Mr. Pomeroy said, and protracted wrangles like Site F have not done the regional image much good.

"We must become more responsive to the public," he said, adding his personal goal would be as a highly visible and easily approachable chairman.

Mr. Pomeroy listed some of the achievements, as he sees them, for Halton Region. High on the list is the Business Development Department, which he said is working hard to attract new industry to Halton.

He noted one Quebec aerospace firm moving to Halton will create about 400 jobs.

On another note, Mr. Pomeroy said the where-to-dump-debate will be crucial in the near future, noting the only dump still open in Halton will be filled to capacity within the next seven months.

# Look cost won't rise

Rural residents can breathe a little easier knowing Halton Region has no plans to increase the cost of septic tank inspections.

Councillors agreed recently to file away a report from former Medical Officer of Health Dr. Peter Cole saying the current provincial system for financing such inspections will continue.

Under the current arrangements, Dr. Cole reported, septic tanks are inspected by the region and the inspections are financed by the provincial Ministry of the Environment.

If the cost of the inspections is higher than the amount paid the Ministry the deficit is covered at the end of year, he added.

Provincial staff have been consulted, he added, "and he has assured us that the practice of paying for program deficit will continue and there is no need to effect a fee increase in order to ensure total cost recovery."

# Search firm is leaving dump hunt

A dispute over the speed at which Halton's search for a new garbage dump is proceeding has lead one of the five consultants employed on the project to resign.

Members of the region's solid waste management committee last week approved the decision to replace the Institute of Environmental Research (IER) with another consultant.

Peter Walker, the consultant directing the effort to justify Halton's choice for a dump site under the Environmental Assessment Act, said IER withdrew from the project because its principles felt the search was going too fast.

"They were definitely unhappy with the pace at which the environmental assessment was proceeding," he said.

Halton is engaged in a lengthy and costly study to find a new dump site and to justify that choice under the terms of the provincial Environmental Assessment Act.

Myra Schiff Consultants Limited has now been engaged to handle the public participation portion of the search and to conduct social impact studies required as part of the process.

Planning director Rash Mohammed assured committee members the final approval of the site choice could still be expected in 1988.
