Testinony beginsin fraud case

Charges of shady business practices and illegal operations in the United States were heard at Milton county court as the fraud trial involving Milton business colleagues Louis Nadalin, Terrance Alty, Bevan Stewart and John Dier continued during the first full week of testimony.

All face charges in connection with a \$7 million vending machine enterprise which operated out of a building at 25 Steeles Ave. in 1980 and 1981.

# Reunion needs you

A fifth man, Oakville lawyer Peter Winn, also charged with fraud offences, has been granted a severance and will be tried in April at a separate trial.

During testimony last week, former office manager Maria Meikle testified she was warned by her boss John Dier, that she would end up dead if he landed in jail.

That statement was made during a telephone conversation between the two when Mrs. Meikle told him she had gone to the police and "told everything" shortly after police their investigation of several vending companies operating from the Steeles Ave. location, in 1981.

Mrs. Meikle who was hired by Terry Alty Jan. 22 of 1980 as a receptionist and secretary, was responsible for sending out brochures to prospective customers who telephoned in response to ads for various vending companies advertised in daily newspapers.

The companies which operated during the two year period included Direct Beverages which was phased out and replaced by Ideal Vendors, Dominion Lighter Sales, which later became Dominion Lighter Sales Inc. and Ideal Piz-

Mrs. Meikle told the court that salesmen from the various companies would invite potential investors, some from as far away as the east coast, to the Steeles Ave. plant where the vending machines were manufactured to discuss the purchase of a distributorship.

# Region backs Pierre's peace junket

Halton regional council wants peace afterall.

Last month members of the administration and finance committee refused to accept a proposal by the City of Stoney Creek to support Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau's peace initiative, but at last Wednesday's council meeting the Prime Minister

received an unanimous show of support.

But it didn't come without a fight. Several council members reiterated earlier arguments that Trudeau's peace initiative was being done for the wrong reasons.

But others contended that any at-

tempt to bring peace was an important step intin the right direction.

"I will support anyone who is trying to bring peace and tranquility to this troubled world," Milton councillor Bill Johnston said.

Oakville Mayor Harry Barrett urged councillors to support the Stoney Creek resolution citing personal experience as his reason for supporting the peace plan.

"All Stoney Creek is doing is trying to get support for peace. Personality has nothing to do with it.

"I happened to be there (war) and am in total favor of promoting peace," said Mayor Barrett.

# for door-to-door drive

The Salvation Army will hold its first-ever residential blitz of Milton as part of the Red Shield Appeal April 30.

In the past, the Salvation Army, which serves the needs of the town, has made its appeal through the mail. But rising need in town has left no option but a more direct approach.

Salvation Army Captain, John Norton says the request for assistance rose 25 per cent for January alone. The Army, with its facilities in Oakville to serve that town and this, handled 119 families in January.

The purpose of the April 30 blitz is to raise funds the Army requires year-round to assist the needy. Capt. Norton said money is sometimes

used to expand services and including, possibly, a store with regular pick-up service and a drop-box. He said the store is slated for the downtown area of Milton. The Army is already looking downtown for a

spot to purchase or rent. Richard Zelinski (827-5324) is blitz organizer for Milton and he is looking for volunteers to help go door-to-door. Anyone
