# Rotary gets ready for Seal campaign

The Rotary Club of Milton once again will be leading in the campaign to aid crippled children through the sale of Easter Seals. This is the 36th year in a row the Rotary Club has co-ordinated fund-raising efforts

on behalf of Easter Seals during March. Chairman of the Rotary Club's Crippled Children and Easter Seals Committee, Bob Scott (878-1526) said Easter Seal material will be sent to every Milton household

during this week. That material will explain what Milton's Rotarians do to aid Crippled Children.

Revenue in Milton is about \$8,000 each year. Half of the money goes to help pay the salaries of district nurses like Mary Comartin who covers Halton for the Crippled Children's Society.

The other half is used to assist families in the purchase of wheel chairs, braces, artificial limbs; plus fees for summer camps and transportation to clinics.

Another very important service provided by the Rotary Club of Milton is the support given to the Credit Valley Treatment Centre, at 2277 South Millway Dr.

The centre was opened in 1978 although fund raising to erect this centre actually began in 1971 when the support of service clubs and organizations was sought.

The \$1.25 million facility is known across Canada as one of the most modern special facilities for handicapped children.

Although the construction costs were paid for prior to opening, there is an annual operating budget, which while assisted by the province, needs continuing private contributions.

The Rotary Club of Milton has been a leader in this regard. Since 1978 the club has donated about \$40,000 in capital costs and they now average about \$6,000 per year in

donations towards the operating costs.

Much of the club's money for the continued fiscal support of the Credit Valley Centre comes from the annual "Rotarama" car draw held usually on July 1 or 2 (Canada

Another way the club hopes to get the message across is through the support of the annual Rotary Easter Seals Dinner and Dance.

This is the tenth year of the soiree which will be held this year on March 31 in the Optimist Centre.

Tickets are \$35 per couple and available from any Rotary Club manager, such as Bob McCreight, manager of the Canada Trust Office on Main St., just opposite the town

Proceeds from the dinner and dance will go into the Milton Rotary Club's Easter Seal Mail campaign. Receipts for tax purposes are available.

Chairman of the dinner and dance committee for Rotary is John Marshall, who can be telephoned at 878-7033.

The Milton Rotary Club also picks a "Timmy" or "Tammy" each year to be the living symbol of what the club is trying to accomplish through the Easter Seal Campaign.

This year's Timmy is 12-year-old Adair Finch, of Milton. To be a Timmy, a child would have to be involved in one or more of the programs assisted by the Rotary Club. Adair will be a celebrity guest on March 31

as the dinner and dance. In the meantime, every member of the club will be hoping to provide information about what Rotary is trying to do for crip-


