morning.

Milton councillors have agreed to proceed with a technical report on a proposed health club to be located in a vacant area of the Bunmaster building on Main St. near Wilson Dr.

The plan calls for four squash courts, two racquetball courts, a dancercise room, an exercise area, bar and lounge plus change rooms.

It will cost approximately \$250,000 to complete interior renovations, according

to Bill Pender, health club operator. Mr. Pender said he has already come to a leasing arrangement with Bunmaster Holdings Inc. and that it would probably take three months to prepare the facility.

A zoning amendment is necessary to

permit a recreational use in the industrial designated area.

According to Mr. Pender, he has already visited homeowners in the vicinity and received "unanimous" positive response to the proposal.

He said he would like to open the facility this fall, but that is unlikely according to councillors, because of the time necessary for reports and zoning change.

This was the second occasion in less than one year Mr. Pender appeared with plans for a health club centre.

He was originally involved in a plan for a similar project to be located near Thompson Rd., but that he has now abandoned that idea.

A new chalet to meet the growing popularity of Glen Eden Ski Area may not be too far down the road, if the local ski hill can repeat last year's financial success.

Following a record winter season which produced 120 skiing days between Dec. 10 and Apr. 1, the Halton Region Conservation Authority has reported an operating surplus of \$360,633.

Bronte work starts

For those travelling northbound on Bronte St., the detour follows Bronte to Heslop Rd., east to Commercial St. and north to Main St.

Those travelling west on Main St. wishing to reach Derry Rd., can take Main St. west to Tremaine Rd. then south to Derry Rd.

The road closure is in effect between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday to Friday.

A total of 104 golfers came out to the Streetsville Glen Golf Club to help raise funds in the annual charity golf tournament.

According to figures produced by the Halton Region Conservation Authority, Glen Eden took in a total revenue of \$920,675 with operating costs amounting to \$560,042.

At a recent meeting of the Authority, members were unanimous in deciding the money would be spent to eliminate all debts.

The surplus was particularly well received in light of last year's disastrous season which left the Authority with an accumulative deficit of \$182,119.

That debt along with a capital loan payment of \$46,983 has been repaid, leaving a surplus of \$131,531. Authority members then

agreed to pay off the remaining three years (\$101,667) of a 10year capital loan, which still left an extra \$24,864. That amount will go toward a

'start-up' fund for next year's operations, according to Murray Stephen, general manager of the Authority. "It is the first time in 10 years

we have not experienced either a capital loan or an operating deficit," said Mr. Stephen who added the Authority is not in favour of another capital loan project until a solid reserve fund has been established.

"We are going to start establishing reserves. . . we have no formula yet, but surpluses will be put into this fund," he said. A favorable 1984-85 season

could, however, put the new chalet on the drawing boards by spring.

"We will wait until after January and then if the figures prove comparable to last year, then we will look at bringing in a consultant to do some drawings and a site selection," said

Mr. Stephen. During last year's ski season, a total of 36,644 daily lift tickets were sold; 20,983 lessons were were sold; 1,440 weekday Lax tax collection passes were sold and 1,346 recreational groups visited Glen Eden.

He noted that the biggest increase in figures over the previous year were in the areas of daily lift tickets, weekday passes and the number of recreational groups.

Mr. Stephen added that figures for the past season were close to double for the previous year, when Glen Eden recorded
