sity for her. With three children and several doctors' appointments each month across the GTA, she said it would be next to impossible to get around otherwise.

Smith said she knows she's not the only one facing hard times, which makes her wonder why federal, provincial and municipal governments aren't doing more to help those struggling to make ends meet.

She said she has recognized her children's friend's families at the food bank -- people she thought were doing all right for themselves.

"It's heartbreaking to know there's so many people that are struggling," she said, adding there's a sense of shame when you find yourself needing help to take care of your family.

She said she knows she shouldn't feel embarrassed, but sometimes she can't help it.

Smith hopes that by sharing her personal story, residents within the community will be more empathetic to those living in poverty.

She said there's a perception that people living on government assistance are lazy, but she wants people to realize there are people who genuinely need the help.

"Although we have gotten help from resources, we have also given back to them when we could," she said. "That is how this world should work when stronger people can help people that aren't so strong."

Smith continued that the more residents open their eyes to the situation, the more work can be done to tackle poverty.

"You can have money one day and (it's) gone the next," she said.


Her priority now is to make sure her children have what they need to grow up healthy and happy.
