

Milton Concert Band to present Fiesta!

Fiesta!, featuring exciting rhythms found in popular Latin music, will be on stage at the Milton Centre for the Arts on Saturday.

The Milton Concert Band (MCB) will present the concert in the Mattamy Theatre at 8 p.m. Dancers from danceScape will be featured along with Robert Tang and Beverley Cayton-Tang, three-time Canadian and two-time North American amateur ballroom dance champions, who will perform a tango.

The MCB began polishing for the Fiesta! concert when it was the heart of winter.

"It was kind of wonderful to come to rehearsal in the snow to play this music," said flute player Annelieke Hogenbirk. "There is something about Latin music that lifts the spirits and triggers memories of sunshine and celebrations." The concert will feature music ranging from Ravel's Bolero to a medley. Acting Music Director Sheena Nykolaiszyn had a great deal of music to choose from for this concert.

"When you stop and think about it, Latin music covers a lot of territory both geographically and musically," said Nykolaiszyn. "You could spend hours listening to Latin music and just brush the surface but there is something about this music that almost demands that there be dancing."

The MCB has enjoyed a long-standing relationship with danceScape, a Milton ballroom dance studio.

"Our students are looking forward to showcasing some of the ballroom dances that they have learned this term. So why shoot large? He said it's because of the range of tone it provides.

His gallery show is a treat since he's used to seeing his work vertically, not horizontally on the walls. Seeing a print enlarged to 40x50 is impressive, he concedes.


"It makes it worthwhile," he said. "I'm happy to see it up, and I'm satisfied the project looks good."

But, he's also hypercritical. He scans his images on the computer for hundreds of hours, inch by inch before they're eventually printed here in Milton at Dorland Haight Gallery.

Of course, it's that same attention to detail that Galway enjoys. The delicate process - a single exposure is an investment in time - compels him to think it through and do it right. There's no going back, especially in winter. Nothing is automatic or digital — it's everything 35-mm photography is not.

His prints will be on display for two months at the gallery, 654 Spring Gardens Rd., across from the Royal Botanical Gardens entrance.


