Knox restoration recognized with award Downtown church among the latest properties honoured by Heritage Milton

For two years, Knox Presbyte- ognizing the fruits of the commurian Church underwent a massive \$1.9-million restoration project.

The congregation met in the basement of the Main Street church every Sunday for service while above them, a major transformation was taking place. The roof underwent major structural changes, using steel reinforcements to make it last another hundred years, original masonry work was restored and the interior walls of the 123-yearold church were refinished in plas-

Now the church stands repaired and restored in the heart of downtown Milton.

For church members' contribution to conserving one of Milton's most prominent buildings within Milton's downtown core, Knox Presbyterian Church was recently honoured with a Heritage Milton Award in Milton Council Chambers.

The award, shaped, coloured and weighing similar to a large stone, recognizes architectural restoration and is given out by Heritage Milton, an advisory committee to town council that maintains an inventory of historic properties and features.

In accepting the award on behalf of the church, Pastor Howard Sullivan,

church historian/archivist Marsha Waldie and senior lay leader Karl Reichert thanked the Town for recnity's labour.

Sullivan said the church is where it belongs, embedded into the fabric of the town.

"To continue being a presence on Main Street is very rewarding," he said, adding that the community really came together to help fund the restoration project. "We hope and pray we will be here for many years to come and that this relationship with the town of Milton will continue to be one of blessing and that the history of Knox Presbyterian Church and the town of Milton prospering together will continue."

Three other properties were also recognized with Heritage Milton awards.

James and Mirella Marshall's work on restoring a heritage home at 121 Mill St., which was built in 1879, was recognized, as well as Matt Jessup's repairs and renovations to a home at 11032 First Line in Moffat.

Richard Balaz also received the award for breathing new life into a barn at 8206 Appleby Line.
