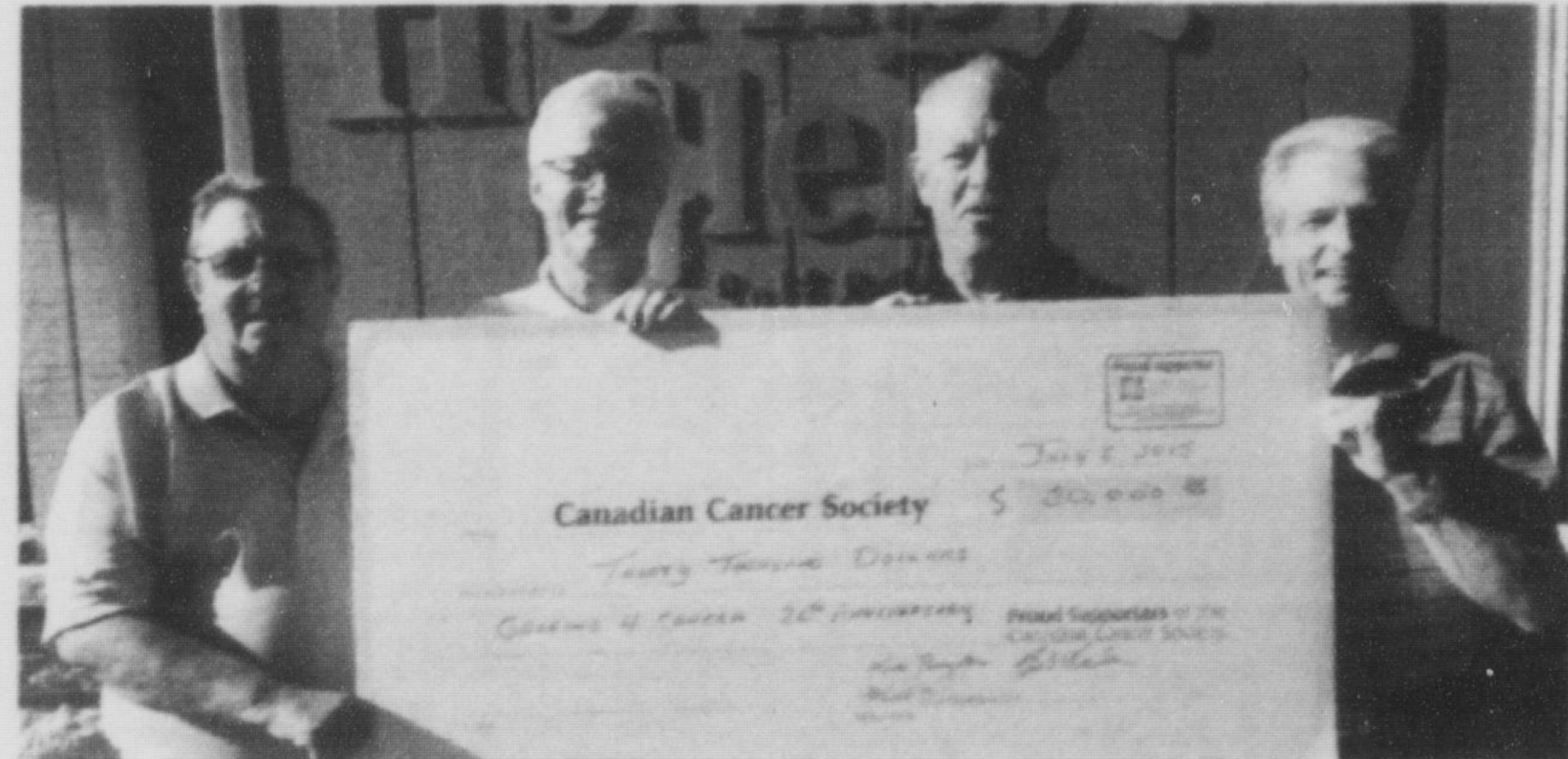
## A look back in time

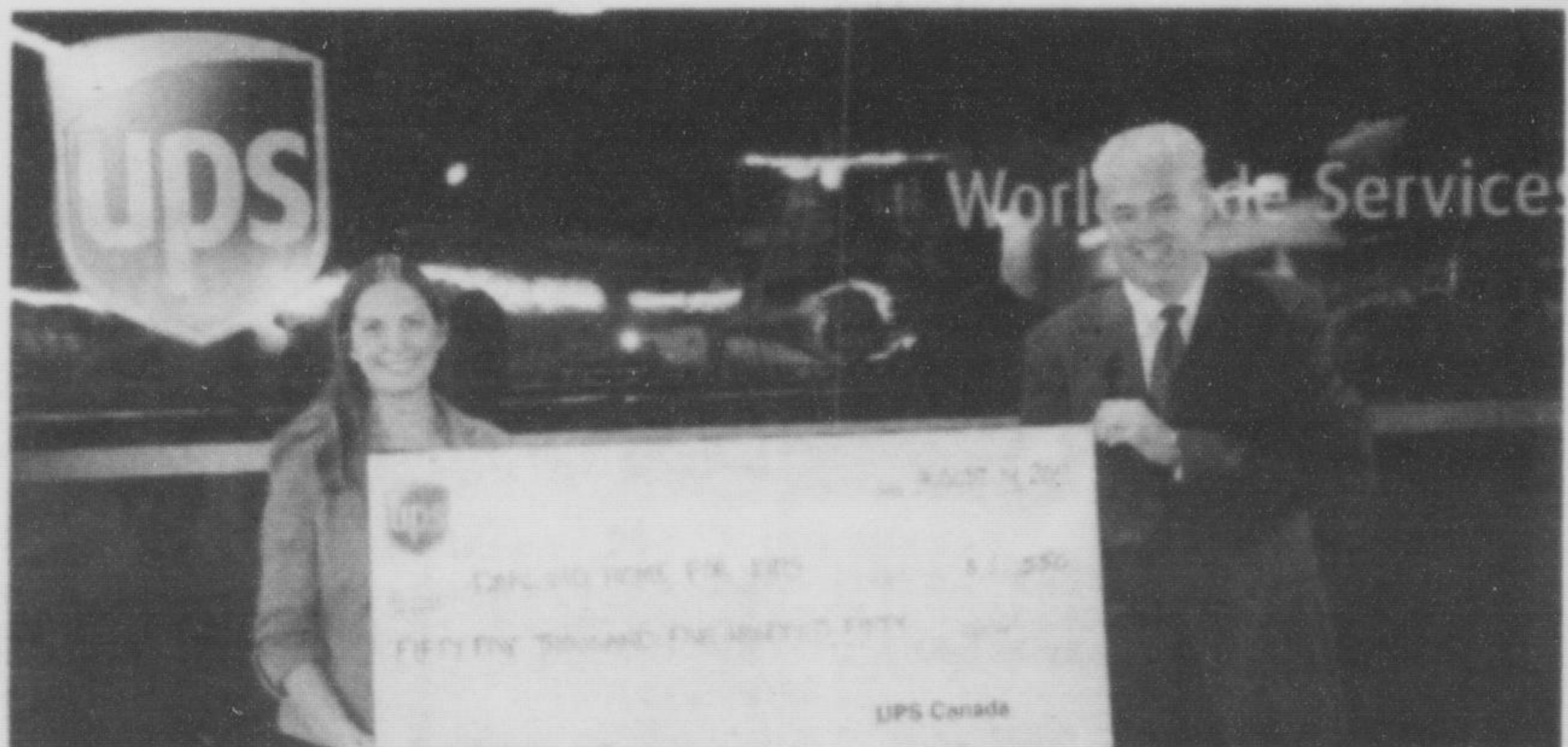
## Grand show of support
