Senior Royals' playoff magic ends in Tier 2 championship

One month into the season, and coming off a crushing 31-0 loss to Oakville Trafalgar, David Montoya offered his 1-3 football team a

harsh dose of reality.

"One more loss and you're eliminated from the playoffs," the Bishop Reding coach told his players.

Over the final three weeks, the Reding defence held its

opponents to a combined 18 points as the Royals rallied to finish 4-3 and claim the fifth of six playoff berths. Still, few could have expected to see the Royals in last week's Halton tier 2 final at Nelson Stadium in Burlington.
