Armstrong and Middaugh rink battle back with exceptional must-win play

"Today's probably the toughest day, because it's back to reality and it's (loss) sinking in... with all the media talking about the winners," Armstrong told the Champion Monday morning. "To come so close after working so hard for three years, yeah it's disappointing. But there's a lot of teams that I'm sure wish they had been in our place. We battled back and made a tonne of clutch shots. I'm thankful for the opportunity."

Echoing the comments of her skip last week, the Milton curler said she felt adequately prepared heading into Winnipeg.

"We planned our season with the goal of peaking for this one week. We scaled back our schedule compared to other years and put in more mental training," explained Armstrong, a multi-time provincial junior champ and member of the 2006 national mixed championship team who curled 94 per cent during Saturday's final. "Honestly, we couldn't have been more prepared."

That was certainly evident after a potentiallydisastrous start to round-robin play.

Coming through under pressure and displaying a great knack for limiting steals, Middaugh and company staved off elimination for three straight days, highlighting their efforts with a 10-4 semifinal rout of reigning national champion Rachel Homan of Ottawa Friday night.

Before that they eclipsed Winnipeg's Chelsea Carey 7-6 in a must-win round-robin finale

and prevailed 6-3 when the same two teams met again in the tiebreaker.

Middaugh's momentum would eventually fade Saturday, as an early mistake — a heavy draw through the house - led to the initial triple for Jones and a couple of tactical miscues hindered her comeback efforts.

Given that they haven't finished higher than third at the Scotties Tournament of Hearts, the Coldwater squad's trip to the Olympic
