While always committed to providing supplemental skill to Milton's youth, Omar Jbaihi says the original name for his soccer school — Mustangs Futbol Academy — gave

some parents a different idea of what was in store.

"I guess when a lot of people heard the word academy the pretense was that there would be teams formed rather than being a school strictly for supplemental skill development," explained the school's technical director, who's also the head coach of the Peel-Halton Soccer League Premier Division's Milltown FC. "I recently got together with a friend of mine in marketing for a rebranding."

Now named the Mustang Soccer School of Excellence and relocated to the Milton Soccer Centre on Main Street after an inaugural year at Oakville's Appleby College, the program kicks off with a private session for



established players this weekend, with registration getting underway Saturday for its winter session start-up in March. With co-ed training at the Under-6 and Under-8 levels and split boys and girls sessions at the Under-10 ranks, the Mustang

school aims to offer a grassroots environment focusing on basic soccer technique and mentality.

"I find a lot of the younger players are overcoached," suggested Jbaihi, who runs the school alongside MFC assistants Roy Howell and Silviu Butnaru. "We take more of a freestyle approach, allowing kids to get comfortable with the ball and be creative. The rights and wrongs of the game can come later.

"I think we're fairly unique in offering supplemental skill rather than a team-oriented program. Our catchphrase is 'A better breed of player."

Even more dominant in the later showdown, the AE Winterhawks — who went 23-3-2 to claim top spot in the Harrison Division — struck early and often to dump the Stoney Creek Jr. Warriors 7-0.

Thomas Jackson was steady but largely untested in the lopsided affair, thanks in part to

a formidable defence, while his counterpart faced all kinds of pressure from a relentless attack and kept the floodgates from bursting completely open with at least a dozen big saves.

Cohen George enjoyed the biggest slice of the scoring pie with two goals and a pair of assists, while Jordon Turley had two goals and an assist and Michael

Amaro also tallied twice. Palmer Grice rounded out the scoring, with three and two-assist contributions made by Ryan Chisholm and Jason Trakas.

The AE minor atoms — who won the Motown Cup earlier this season — are back in action Saturday in Flamborough.
