Smith thrilled to be back on competitive skating scene with powerhouse NEXXICE

It was her first season removed from the competitive synchronized skating scene, and Victoria Smith was definitely feeling a void.

With her recently revamped Montreal club no longer offering a senior team, the 20-year-old Miltonian was suddenly on the sidelines — and at a crossroads.

"It was the hardest decision of my life and I wrestled with it for a long time," admitted Smith, who's been involved in synchronized skating for the past decade and has made two trips to the world championships as a junior with Brampton's Gold Ice. "I'd worked so hard to get into McGill (University). But I'd come there to skate and now I wasn't ... that was a problem." The prospect of transferring schools to resume her skating made for several months of soul-searching and more than a little anxiety, until a spring phone call provided an undeniable revelation of just how

In Charlottetown, PEI Saturday night the veteran reinsman successfully defended his O'Brien Award as Standardbred Canada's Driver of the Year — getting the nod over first-time nominee Doug McNair of Guelph.
