Crime rate record low in 2013

Halton police say 2013 set a record for having the lowest crime rate since Halton became a region in 1974.

In a report to the Halton Regional Police Service Board last Thursday, Chief Stephen Tanner noted Halton saw 10,804 criminal offences in 2013 — compared to 12,076 the previous year.

That's a 10.5 per cent drop in numbers, but translates to a 12.7 per cent drop in the crime rate, when the region's growing population is factored in, said Tanner.

And that crime rate is the lowest seen since Halton became a region in 1974, said the chief.

"Let me congratulate the entire service for continuing to have a very positive impact on reducing crime throughout the Region," said Tanner.
