

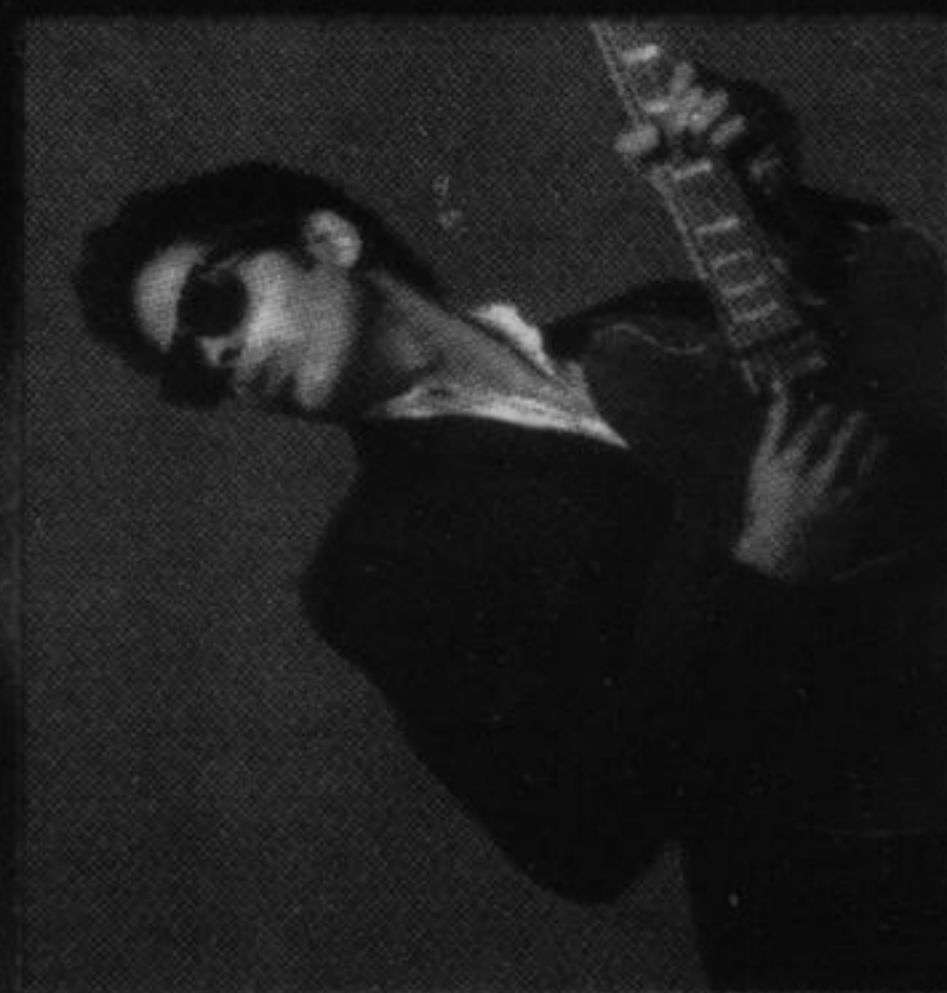

MILTON TIME CAPSULES

Proposed monument issue surfaces

Time Capsules are gems of information extracted from past issues of the Champion and other publications in order to provide a window into Milton's past.

March 1920

At Monday evening's meeting of the town council the reeve introduced a motion to consider taking action in connection with the proposed monument to the memory of soldiers from the Milton neighborhood who fell in the Great War.

He did so on account of the failure of the committee of citizens to report after having the matter in hand for more than a year.

But as the committee has not been discharged the council, on motion by the mayor, deferred action for the present.

The committee's delay has been due to disagreement. The majority of its members favored a monument, but a minority stood out for a hospital.

The relatives of the fallen were canvassed and were reported to be unanimous in desiring a monument but though their wishes should

have carried great weight, they did not influence the advocates of the hospital who continued their opposition.

But for this, the monument might have been erected last year.

It is high time for the committee to get together again, come to an agreement and report or dissolve, so that the council may be free to act.

From the first the *Champion* has taken the ground that the most fitting memorial would be a monument that future generations would never misunderstand its meaning and that within a few years a so-called memorial building would be meaningless.

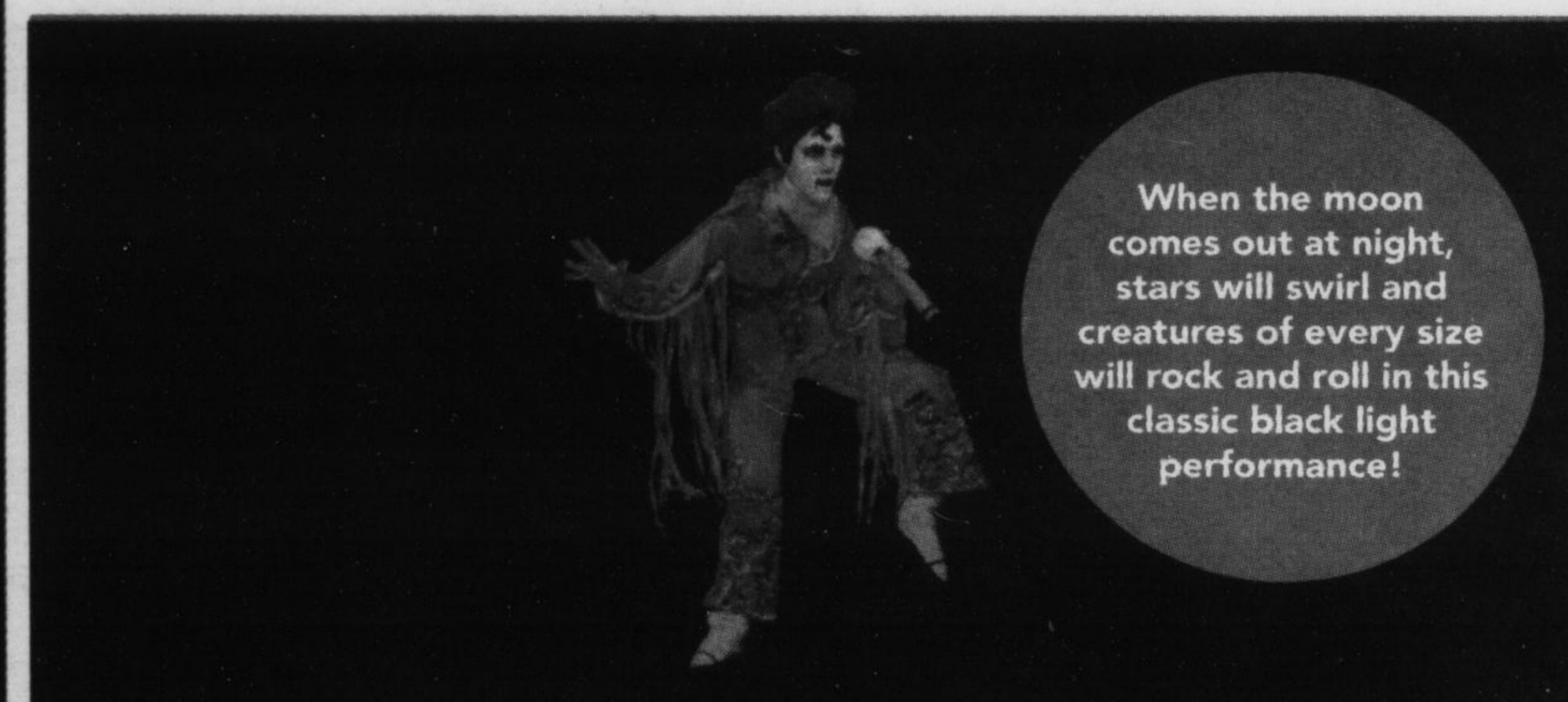
