Dodson and CP Canadians fall short in RBC Cup final — again

Portage Terriers.


Playing in every game of the nationals after being mainly a healthy scratch last year, 18-year-old right

Springers punctuate season with eastern nationals gold

As two of just four all-around provincial champions in the 41-year history of the Milton Springers Gymnastics Club, Keiara Jones-Tyrell and Diana Dela Pena were already in pretty select company.

But a trip to Moncton, New Brunswick earlier this month put them in an even more exclusive group. One that didn't exist until now.

Punctuating the season in golden fashion, 14-year-old Keiara and 10-year-old Diana gave the club its first-ever overall titles at the Eastern Canadian Championships — doing so in the Open 8 and Tyro 7 divisions respectively. "It's an amazing accomplish-

ment... a great way to cap off the year," said Springers head coach Craig Smith. "This has been my most fulfilling season as a coach, both from the program's development as a whole and how the season ended."

An all-around silver medalist at last month's provincials in Windsor, Diana figured a trip to the eastern national

podium was within her reach. But standing atop it was probably too much to hope for.

Not so as it turned out, as she and delivered first-place finishes on bars and beam en route to overall supremacy.

She rounded out the weekend with a third on vault and fourth on floor. Her scores on bars and floor were both personal bests, as was her overall tally.


"I was kind of surprised (to claim all-around gold)," said Diana, who became the club's third-ever provincial champion last spring. "I just tried to listen to my coaches' instructions and do my best."

Having dominated provincial competition all season long, Keiara headed to Moncton as a distinct medal favourite — especially after adding some

strong showings in Las Vegas and Chicago to her unbeaten run within Ontario boundaries.

With that in mind, she met her all-around eastern national triumph with relief as much as happiness.

"I didn't put a lot of expectation on myself, but it was good to finish well," said Keiara, who along with Di-
