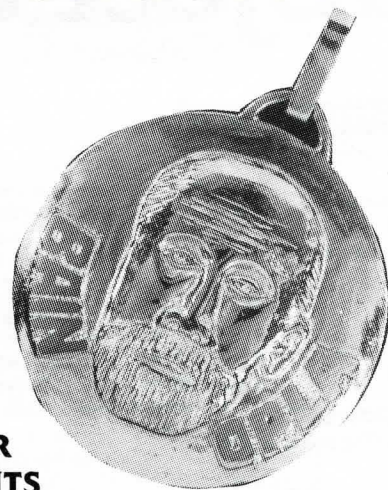

SUNDAY'S PLENARIES RESHAPE OUR VIEWS

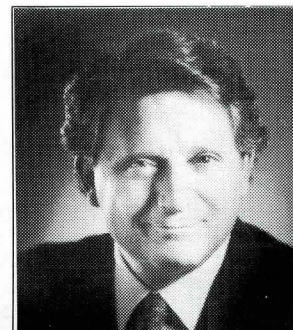
