However, it is this environment that has produced the support for the social good, public education and publicly accessible libraries. The method in which we separate and organize our information is a symbol of our Canadian identity.

The speech had the depth OLA centenary organizers were looking for as part of its series of distinguished as the Association takes its members to the millennium and to the OLA's hundredth birthday in 2000. The reaction of the audience in spite of the late hour showed considerable appreciation.



The first list of official selections will be unveiled during Saturday morning's annual Silver Birch breakfast.

The 1997 fiction winner of OLA's Silver Birch Award, Eric Walters, will be in attendance. Non-fiction winner Shelley Tanaka cannot participate.

The 1997 Silver Birch Awards were voted on by some 18,000 young readers in Grades 4, 5 and 6 last May. 35,000 took part in the program.



"Survival Skills for Teacher Librarians" has therefore been added to the schedule. It will take place Friday at 3:30 p.m. in Room 202C.

"It is not enough that the teacherlibrarian is competent, enthusiastic and motivated," says Hamilton. His workshop explores the "practical politics" that the teacher-librarian must employ to advance his or her cause in the school.

This workshop is a call to recognize that teachers and administrators must be the force behind the school library program not merely driven by it. This workshop was motivated by the article "Survival Tips for an Endangered Species" by John Caldwell and Donald Hamilton that appeared in School Libraries in Canada, Spring 1996.
